

Castelgandolfo Border Agreement Signed
Vatican City (NC) — Following lengthy negotiations, a new agreement has been concluded between the Holy See and the Italian Government concerning the boundary lines of the extraterritorial property which in-

cluded the Papal summer villa at Castelgandolfo south of Rome, it has been announced here.
The agreement, which provides for slight rectifications of the demarcation lines, was signed by Msgr. Domenico Tardini, Secretary for Extraordinary Affairs in the Papal Secretariate of State, on behalf of the Holy See, and by Antonio Mell Lupi di Soranga Tarasconi, Italian Ambassador to the Holy See, for Italy. The agreement will take effect after its ratification.

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Spain Gets New Rota For Marriage Cases

Madrid (NC) — Solemn inauguration of the Rota Tribunal, restored to Spain by decree of His Holiness Pope Pius XII, has taken place at the Apostolic Nunciature here. The previous Rota Tribunal, created in Spain by Pope Clement XII during the time of Emperor Charles V, was discontinued when the Spanish republic instituted civil marriage. The Rota Tribunal serves as a court of appeal from the diocesan and metropolitan courts, but it cannot handle any cases of first instance, and litigants are free to appeal from its decisions to the Sovereign Pontiff.

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
