55 St. Ambrose Men Set New Retreat Record

With 55 men in the group from St. Ambrose Parish making the week-end closed retreat at Our Lady of the Lake Retreat House a new record for attendance was established at the diocesan lay retreat center.

In establishing the record, men from St. Ambrose Parish exceeded their own high mark of 53 set last year. This makes three successive years in which the St. Ambrose group has set a new high mark for attendance.

Among the retreatants from June 11 to June 13 were two sets of brothers and two father and son combinations. Clarence Francis and Joseph Schultze comprised one team of brothers, while Frederick and Gerard Strauss formed the other set.

J. V. Mooney and his son, J. Raymond Mooney and Rocco Fischette and his son, Bernard J. Fischette were the two father and son combinations. Fifteen new men were reported among the St. Ambrose retreatants, fourteen of whom had never made a retreat at Geneva heretofore.

CONFERENCES were conducted by the Rev. Thomas J. Sanderson, C.S.S.R. and the Rev. John Geary, C.S.S.R. Talks were all directed to the single theme, the Sermon on the Mount and the lessons to be learned from the Beatitudes. Meals under the supervision of the Rev. Edmund J. Bowen, C.S.S.R., were reported up to the high standard which has made the Retreat House widely known throughout the diocese for its cuisine.

CAPACITY of the Retreat House is 55 according to the Rev. Rev. Augustine Aylward, C.S.S.R., and more than that number cannot be accommodated conveniently. When a group's number exceeded 55, it has been necessary to divide the group over two week-ends or between a week-end and a midweek retreat.

This weekend June 18 to 20, retreatants from St. Charles Borromeo parish Rochester, from Greece, and from Hilton will occupy the Retreat House and a capacity of nearly a third of the group is expected. Castelgandolfo Border Agreement Signed

Vatican City, (N.C.) — Following lengthy negotiations a new agreement has been concluded between the Holy See and the Italian Government concerning the boundary lines of the extraterritorial property, which included the Papal summer villa at Castelgandolfo south of Rome, it has been announced here.

The agreement which provides for slight rectifications of the demarcation lines, was signed by Msgr. Domenico Tardini, Secretary for Extraordinary Affairs in the Papal Secretariate of State on behalf of the Holy See, and by Antonio Mell Luigi di Soranga Tarasconi, Italian Ambassador to the Holy See for Italy. The agreement will take effect after its ratification.

Msgr. Stauder Observes Two Anniversaries

Forty years a priest of Rochester diocese, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. F. William Stauder will mark his Silver Jubilee as pastor of Holy Redeemer Church, Rochester, on July 8.

His parishioners at the Mon signor's request will receive Holy Communion and offer prayers to mark the anniversary on Sunday, July 6.

Msgr. Stauder observed his 40th anniversary in the Holy Priesthood with a Solemn High Mass on June 6. Assisting were the Rev. William J. Schifferl as Deacon, and the Rev. Raymond J. Wahl, Subdeacon. Father Schifferl paid tribute to the pastor's long and fruitful career as a priest and particularly stressed what had been accomplished at Holy Redeemer Church.

Also in the Sanctuary were the Rev. Walter Carron and the Rev. Richard Quinn of St. Andrew's Seminary faculty.

CHILDREN of Holy Redeemer School in the afternoon reviewed Msgr. Stauder's career in an original pageant in which highlights were dramatized.

The Jubilarian, who as diocesan director, was one of the founders of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union, was born in Germany, and came to the United States at an early age. He attended St. Michael's School until 1895 and was graduated from Corpus Christi School in 1898.

After graduation from St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries, Msgr. Stauder was ordained on June 6, 1908. His first assignment on June 8, 1908 was Assistant Pastor of SS. Peter and Paul's Church. He was named Pastor of Holy Trinity Church, Webster, Jan. 20, 1921 and of Holy Redeemer Church, July 8, 1933.
