Summer Reading Urged To Curb Secularism

To prevent intellectual infection by the heresy of secularism, Catholics must have a reading diet well-balanced by Catholic publications, Miss Lucy Sheehan told the Social Justice Club of Rochester at a meeting Saturday. Miss Sheehan is a member of the Catholic Women's Speakers Bureau.

Recommending summer reading of Catholic books for summer leisure hours, Miss Sheehan pointed out that Catholics who are constantly exposed to a secularistic philosophy must have a firm foundation of Catholic doctrine to combat the infectious modern heresy.

Miss Sheehan recommended "pleasant, palatable" Catholic books to "attain and maintain spiritual vim and vigor and vitality."

"Catholic papers and magazines are playing an important role in aiding us to form a Catholic mind on questions of current interest, whether local, national or international," said the speaker.

"If you read the 'Reader's Digest' why not read the 'Catholic Digest'? If you read 'Collar' why not read 'The Sign'? If you read 'Saturday Evening Post' why not 'America' or if you read the daily paper, why not 'The Catholic Courier Journal'?"

She assured her audience that Catholic literature rates high in entertainment value and that excellent fiction, good humor, high adventure and soul-stirring romance both human and divine are to be found in Catholic books.

Knights of St. John Set For Buffalo Convention

Led by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, Supreme Spiritual Advisor of the Knights of St. John, a large delegation of Rochester Regiment Knights and Ladies Auxiliary will head for Buffalo Sunday, June 27, for the Supreme Convention of the organization.

Convention sessions will open with a Solemn Pontifical Mass Monday, June 28, at St. Joseph's Cathedral, celebrated by the Most Rev. John F. O'Hara, Bishop of Buffalo. Bishop Kearney will preach the sermon.

Tuesday morning at 8:30 the Solemn Memorial Mass will be offered for departed members of the Knights and Ladies Auxiliary at St. Louis Church. Business sessions are slated at 10 o'clock that morning and at 2 p. m. in the afternoon.

Washington—(NC)—The U. S. Catholic Press Association will hold its 39th convention in Denver, Colo., on June 2 and 3, 1948.

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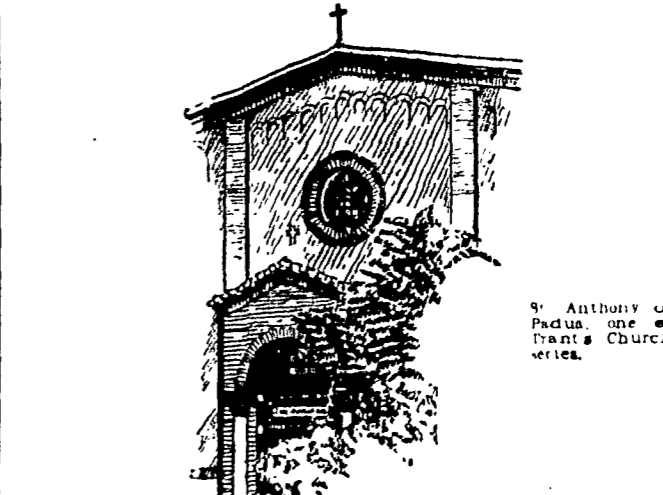
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
