

Msgr. De Regge Mass to Mark Anniversary

An Anniversary Mass for the late Rt. Rev. Msgr. Hippolyte De Regge, will be offered at Our Lady of Victory Church, Tuesday, July 13 at 8 a. m.

Monsignor De Regge was the first Chancellor of Rochester Diocese and served under the first Bishop, the Most Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid. He built the Church of Our Lady of Victory in 1868.

Our Lady of Victory Church, better known as "The Little French Church" on Pleasant Street will be redecorated in anticipation of the centennial observance of the parish. It was announced today.

Born in Ghent, Belgium, Dec. 17, 1830, Monsignor De Regge followed a course of studies at the Jesuit college of St. Barbe and made his theological studies at the Grand Seminary of Ghent. He was recognized as a brilliant student. Ordained at the age of 23 he was made professor of dogmatic theology at St. Andrew's Seminary of Renoix.

He came to Rochester and became a capable assistant to Bishop McQuaid whom he accompanied to Rome for the Vatican council.

The Bishop appointed Father De Regge as chancellor and also president of the newly erected St. Andrew's Seminary. He was made a domestic prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor by His Holiness Pope Leo XIII.

He was held in high esteem by both Catholics and non-Catholics in Rochester and died in Antwerp, Belgium while on a vacation there.

Fr. Gilligan To Leave For China Mission Post

Rev. Justinian Gilligan, C.P., son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel J. Gilligan, 38 1/2 Austin St., will sail Saturday, July 10, from San Francisco, for China where he will engage in missionary work in the recently created Diocese of Yuanling. He will first pursue a 2-year course in language and customs at Peiping.

Father Justinian is one of eight Passionist priests assigned to serve in the Orient under Most Rev. Cuthbert O'Garra, Bishop of Yuanling Diocese, who was one of the first members of his Community to labor in the Near East.

Father Justinian, whose baptismal name is John, has two sisters, Mrs. John Mastrella and Miss Patricia Ann Gilligan and one brother, Paul Gilligan.

After graduating from Holy Apostles School, he attended St. Andrew's Seminary for 3 years. In 1933 he entered the Passionist Preparatory Seminary in Dunkirk. He was clothed in the Passionist habit in August, 1940, at the Passionist Novitiate, St. Paul's Monastery, Pittsburgh. One year later he made his profession of vows. Father Justinian pursued his studies for the priesthood in the various Passionist monasteries in the east. He was ordained at St. Michael's Monastery Church Union City, N. J. last Feb. 25 by Bishop James A. McNulty, and celebrated his first Solemn High Mass in Rochester on Feb. 29 at Holy Apostles Church.

Impressive departure ceremonies were conducted for the eight Passionist Missionaries June 27 at Scranton, Pa., at Boston on June 30, with Archbishop Cushing presiding and at Chicago on July 5, with Cardinal Stritch presiding.

Father Justinian was in Rochester during the most part of June visiting with his family and friends.

Very Rev. E. J. McCorkell, C.S.B., was reelected Superior General of the Basilian Fathers community for a term of six years at the general chapter held in Toronto, this week.

The General Council for the next six years includes the Rev. Daniel J. Dillon, C.S.B., the Rev. Hubert Coughlin, C.S.B., the Rev. John H. O'Loane, C.S.B., and the Rev. George B. Flahiff, C.S.B.

Father O'Loane is a former principal of Aquinas Institute. Father Flahiff is professor of medieval history in the Pontifical Institute of Medieval Studies. Father Dillon was formerly in Rochester as superior and treasurer of the Basilian House here. Father Coughlin has for many years been professor of dogmatic theology in St. Basil's Seminary.

Milliken Upholds Political Service At First Ukrainian Park Dedication

Americans were urged to serve in the field of politics by Cornelius J. Milliken of Elmira in his speech at the dedication of St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church's park in Elmira Heights, Monday. He upheld politics as "an honorable profession, a highly developed science, the science of government."

Mr. Milliken, prominent Catholic layman of the Southern Tier, is president of Elmira Deaneery Union of the Holy Name Society. The new park located at Garfield St. and McCauley Ave., Elmira, is the first in New York State to be provided by a Ukrainian Church.

IN HIS ADDRESS stressing the need for right consideration of politics and politicians, Mr. Milliken also paid tribute to the Ukrainian people of Elmira Heights and their pastor, the Rev. Waldimir Dowhovitch, pastor of St. Nicholas Church and his assistant, the Rev. Stephen P. Shymansky, assistant pastor under both of whose guidance the park was completed.

"The word 'politics' has been bandied about and ridiculed for too long a time," Milliken said in his address. He declared the fact that it has been a sport too long "to brand a person as a politician in order to belittle him."

"But some of the most respected persons in this community, in any community, in the state and in the nation are politicians—the men and women who run our governments, from the town right up to Washington.

"The vast majority engaged in politics are men and women of integrity, honest, upright and genuinely sincere in their desire to serve the public," he declared.

IN HIS TRIBUTE to the Ukrainian people, Mr. Milliken said:

"The character of you and your antecedents for generations has been molded in the crucible of suffering and hardship. That is why America is the gainer for the tribulations and trials you have endured; why the infusion of your culture into the American fabric of society is one of the ennobling factors contributing to its greatness.

"Under the inspiring and zealous leadership of your good pastor, Father Dowhovitch, and his assistant, Father Shymansky, you have presented the means whereby Christian character may be fully developed and expressed.

"The entire community is indebted to Father Dowhovitch for his vision and the gifts of achievement that makes this park possible. Over 40 years he has spent in the priesthood, serving, guiding, helping, spiritually and materially, those placed under his charge."

8 Catholic High Grid Teams To Meet Aquinas

With the cancellation of Boys Town of Nebraska team and the signing up of St. Thomas High School of Houston, Texas, Aquinas Institute has eight opponents scheduled in widely separated parts of the nation.

The Boys Town game in Rochester was cancelled because the State of Nebraska will not allow the school to play more than four games out of the state. The Aquinas-Boys Town game would have been a fifth out-of-state game.

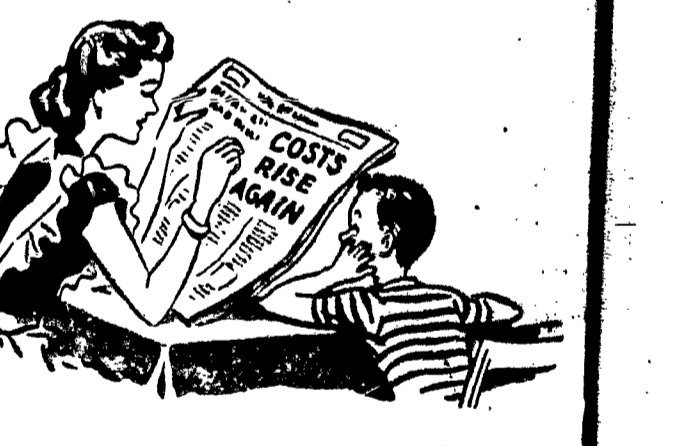
Bereaved were all veterans: Charles Mueller, Robert Platonous, Ray Placius, William Seyboth, Robert Laemlein and Homer Loeber.
