

Open Persecution in Red China Seen Subsiding

PEKING (AP)—The open persecution of the Church by the Chinese Communists has subsided in recent weeks, but a deep-seated opposition to the Church and all religion continues, according to a letter received here from a missionary deep in Red-held territory.

The easing of persecution is believed here to be due to the wide publicity given recently to the Red excesses against the missionaries. To avoid any kind of reprisals the missionary uses pseudonyms for the missions and priests of whom he speaks in the letter.

"Anti-religious measures have subsided a bit," the letter says. "Father B. went out bravely and spent Easter at 'Highwall.' But he had to leave the place the same day. Too many Christians crowded to his Mass, and this the authorities resented. He is tolerated at 'Oldtown' now, however.

"For one month he was able to visit all his Christians untroubled. I fear that he was not seen by any pagans during the whole month. The nights go swiftly. Confessions, a sermon, conversation with the people, breakfast. Just after midnight he offers Mass. Then he walks a few hours to the next group of Christians, where he stays them

Msgr. De Regge Mass to Mark Anniversary

An Anniversary Mass for the late Rt. Rev. Msgr. Hippolyte De Regge, will be offered at Our Lady of Victory Church, Tuesday, July 13 at 8 a. m.

Monsignor De Regge was the first Chancellor of Rochester. Diocese and served under the first Bishop, the Most Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid. He built the Church of Our Lady of Victory in 1868.

Our Lady of Victory Church, better known as "The Little French Church" on Pleasant Street will be rededicated in anticipation of the centennial observance of the parish. It was announced today.

Born in Ghent, Belgium, Dec. 17, 1830, Monsignor De Regge followed a course of studies at the Jesuit college of St. Barbe and made his theological studies at the Grand Seminary of Ghent. He was recognized as a brilliant student. Ordained at the age of 23 he was made professor of dogmatic theology at St. Andrew's Seminary of Renk.

He came to Rochester and became capable assistant to Bishop McQuaid whom he accompanied to Rome for the Vatican council.

The Bishop appointed Father De Regge as chancellor and also president of the newly erected St. Andrew's Seminary. He was made a domestic prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor by His Holiness Pope Leo XIII.

He was held in high esteem by both Catholics and non-Catholics in Rochester and died in Antwerp, Belgium while on a vacation there.

Governor Gives Address At Holy Cross Graduation
Boston (AP)—Governor Robert F. Bradford of Massachusetts today addressed the 273 graduates of the 122nd commencement of the College of the Holy Cross here, that it is not from others who threaten our institutions that we face danger but in ourselves, for it is we who must maintain what we have created.

"There is much talk today of an atomic war, of a clash between east and west, of the infiltration of alien and atheistic influences, the governor said. 'But the real crisis of today is not to be found in the headlines. It is not alone the rim of democracy, but at its core. It rests with every one of us as an individual and only as individuals working together, shoulder to shoulder, can we safeguard that core.'

Health Insurance Status Or Priests, Nuns Clarified
London (AP)—The parish clergy of England and Wales are generally "self-employed persons" who are "genuinely occupied," the Bishops decided when they discussed the new national health regulations covering all persons from 15 to 65 in the British Isles.

The new plan, which went into effect on July 5, provides that all persons between these ages must be insured for medical and similar treatment and pay contributions for that insurance. It divides insured persons into three classes: employed persons; self-employed persons (described as persons genuinely occupied who are not employed under a contract of service); and non-employed persons.

Resistance Bishop Honored By Nazis
Brussels (AP)—Bishop Louis Kerkhofs of Liege has been awarded the honor of Grand Officer of the Order of the Crown by Prince-Regent Charles of Belgium for his courageous resistance to the Nazis during the country's occupation by the Germans.

Emphasizing the Bishop's firm stand against the occupying power, Belgian Minister of Justice Struye, who presented the award, declared that throughout the occupation the prelate generously aided victims of the enemy regime, especially Jews.

The reminder was made by the Rev. Benjamin Nunez, founder of the Rerum Novarum Catholic labor movement in Costa Rica and Minister of Labor in the country's present Government.
