200 Nuns Attend Summer Sessions At Nazareth C.

Nazareth College opened its regular Summer Session this week with a registration of over 200 students. In attendance are religious from Cleveland, Baltimore, Vermont, Watertown, Malone, as well as representatives from all the teaching communities of the Diocese.

The courses offered this Summer include Religion, Latin, Poetry, Education, English, History, Mathematics, French, German, Italian, Spanish, Music, Biology, Secretarial Science, and Sociology. The curriculum leads to the degrees of Bachelor of Education, Bachelor of Arts, and Bachelor of Science.

A Summer Lecture on Visual Aids in Catholic Education will be given in the College Auditorium on Thursday, July 15, at 2 p. m. by Anatole Lindsay, Director of the Catholic Department of Visual Education of FILMS, Inc.

Mr. Lindsay has written an article, "The Cinema and the Liberal Arts," published in a recent issue of *The Catholic Mind* in which he stresses the great and growing importance of educating youth to an appreciation of and discernment between good and bad films.



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As a result of the agitation caused by certain comic books having been declared a menace to readers especially youthful readers, an organization of newsdealers from Elmira, Corning, Athens, Wellsburg, Watkins Glen and vicinity was formed Sunday night at Langwell Hotel, Elmira.

C. B. Richardson of Athens, attending the meeting as an observer, declared: "This problem is nationwide and people are taking action on it." He told of a similar move in the Valley to form a dealer organization there.

The new association has the temporary title of Southern Tier Retail Magazine and Newsdealers Association. The next meeting is scheduled for Monday, July 19 at 9 p. m. at the Langwell Hotel in Elmira.

ELECTED UNANIMOUSLY as president was Fred D. Crispin. He was placed in nomination by Leslie D. Kelly whose action in throwing out comics and other books regarded as undesirable for children attracted the attention of the publishers and the manner in which they are distributed.

Mr. Kelly quoted a statement from Mr. Crispin suggesting that the group "promote the sale of clean and constructive literature" and deal with grievances of newsdealers in this area.

"A code of ethics will be set up," Mr. Kelly said. "And we hope that the public will assist us."

Atton Fisher of the Northside Sweets Shop, Corning, urged each member to see other dealers in his community about joining the organization.

"THE DRUGGISTS are 100 per cent behind this effort," declared Francis T. Steed, president of the Southern Tier Pharmaceutical Association.

Other members of the executive committee are: John F. Kosmicki, vice president; Jack Irish of Watkins Glen, secretary, and Stanley E. Weld, treasurer.

Elected to the board of directors were: Mr. Kelly, Mr. Fisher, John Dunn of Wellsburg and Theodore Pitts and Joseph R. Johnson of Elmira.

Mr. Kelly drew the meeting's attention to the new Association of Comics Magazine Publishers set up July 1 to attempt self-regulation of the industry.

Thousands of Catholics in Rochester Diocese are continuing daily to remember the desperate need of Europe's war-ridden destitute.

Among the many local campaigns is that of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, who are now seeking particularly for infants' clothing to be sent to the "Pope's Storehouse."

The Rev. John T. Callahan, chaplain of Our Lady of Mercy High School, pointed out this week that the Sisters of Mercy are sending out many packages, and that anyone wishing to donate food or other articles may do so by leaving them at the Blossom Road school anytime during the summer.

Typical of many letters of appreciation, Father Callahan said, are two recently received from England. From the nuns who teach at St. Lucy's school, Leeds, to whom were sent some packages of food, came a letter which says in part: "We managed a dinner on Saturday an Sunday; the rest of the week we live on all sorts of odds and ends." From Tyburn Convent, London, came a note stating: "We never thought we should consider soap such a treasure."

Food and shoes still are Europe's top needs, Father Callahan pointed out.

Final Tribute Paid Dean Of Normal School

Funeral services for Sister Anna de Paul Quigley of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph were conducted Monday, July 12 by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Edward F. Hoban, Bishop of Cleveland.

Sister Anna de Paul, for 32 years dean of Nazareth Normal School, died Friday morning July 9, 1948.

Solemn Mass of Requiem was offered by Bishop Hoban in Nazareth Convent Chapel, Pittsford. Diocesan priests paid tribute to the work of Sister Anna de Paul in teacher training by assisting Bishop Hoban at the Mass.

Sister Anna de Paul was born in Rochester, the daughter of the late Chief of Police Joseph M. Quigley and Ann Sullivan Quigley. In 1910 she entered the Sisters of Saint Joseph, and after teaching two years at Corpus Christi School and Nazareth Academy, she became director of the elementary training department of the Community of the Sisters of St. Joseph. When the charter was granted for the conferring of the Bachelor of Education degree, she became dean of that division in the college program.

AN ACTIVE MEMBER of the National Catholic Music Educators Association, Sister Anna de Paul, was secretary of the diocesan unit. At the time of her death, she was working with the diocesan superintendents of New York State on a music curriculum under the direction of the Commission on American Citizenship founded by the late Dr. George J. Johnson of Catholic University.

Surviving are three brothers, the Rev. Raymond Quigley of Chicago, Ill., Gerald Quigley, and Dr. Harold Quigley of Rochester; also several nieces and nephews.

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Martyr Shrine Trip Listed By War Vets

A public pilgrimage to the Shrine of the North American Martyrs on Sunday, August 15, sponsored by the Catholic War Veterans is being promoted by the CWV units in Rochester diocese, according to County Commander Alfred L. Green of Monroe County Chapter.

The pilgrimage to the Auriesville Shrine is the first to be sponsored by the Catholic War Veterans and they are seeking to have a record attendance, County Chairman Edward W. Esse of the Monroe chapter, said.

Plans for the pilgrimage are outlined in the July Bulletin of the Monroe Chapter out today. Five facts are emphasized as follows:

"1. New York State Dept. CWV is sponsoring this pilgrimage as its Catholic Action project for 1948 in order to give ALL Catholics throughout New York State an opportunity to visit the place where America's first canonized martyrs died for the Catholic Faith; to see the birthplace of Kateri Tekakwitha, Lily of the Mohawks. Over 75,000 pilgrims visited the shrine last summer.

"2. August 15 is the Feast of the Assumption of Our Lady, patroness of the Catholic War Veterans. What better way to honor Our Lady on her feast!

"3. August 15 is the third anniversary of V J day. The pilgrimage is designed to provide a most worthy tribute to our honored war dead.

"4. Because this is a statewide project the cost of the round trip will be only \$10.00. The DePres Travel Agency in the Powers Hotel Lobby will handle the tickets. Mail \$5.00 is the number.

"5. Every Catholic War Veteran, his wife, family and friends are invited to make this pilgrimage. Leave early in the morning, be back the same night. Stir up interest; get your church groups interested; this is for all Catholics and CWV is merely the driving force behind this CAMPAIGN FOR CHRIST."

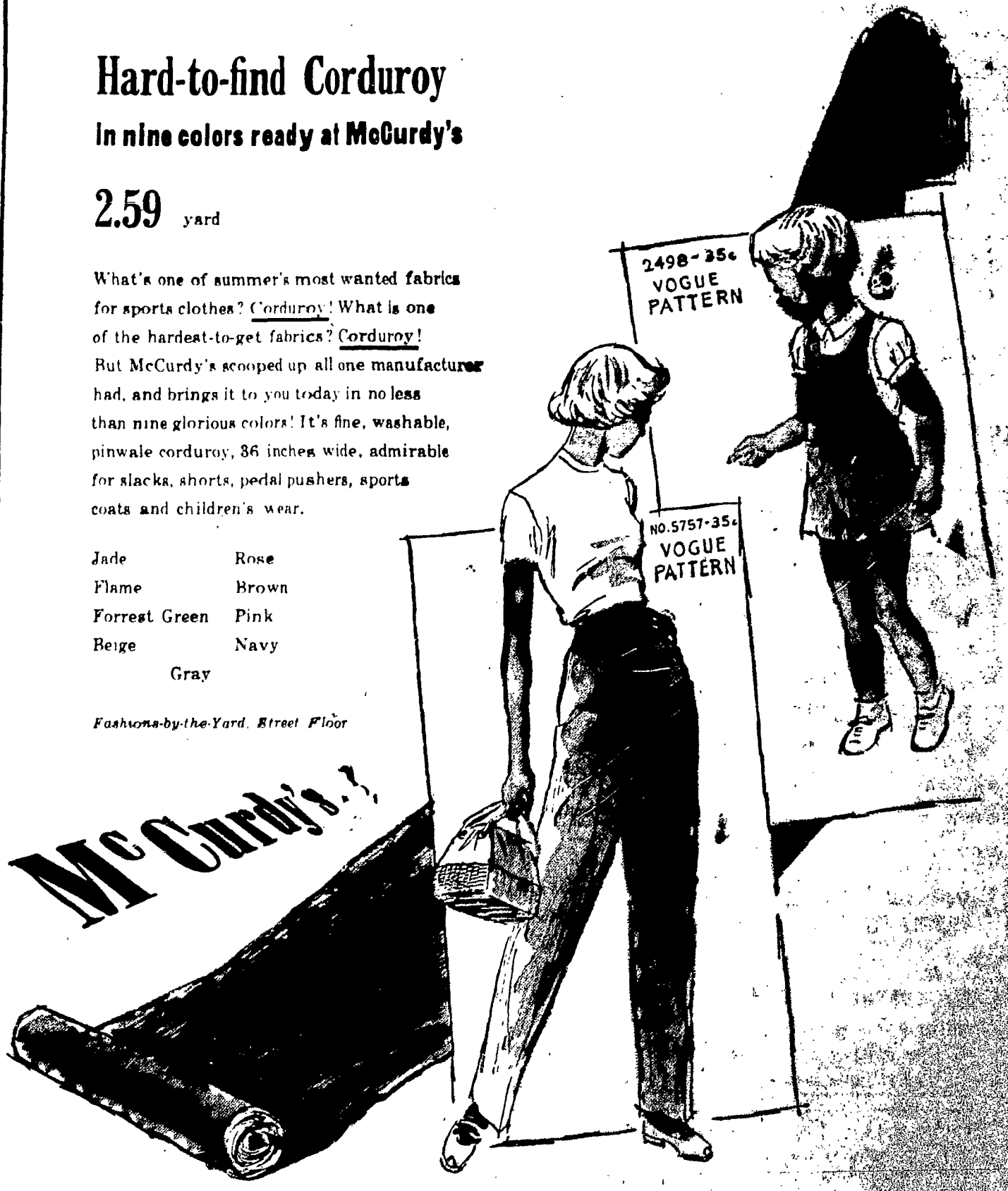
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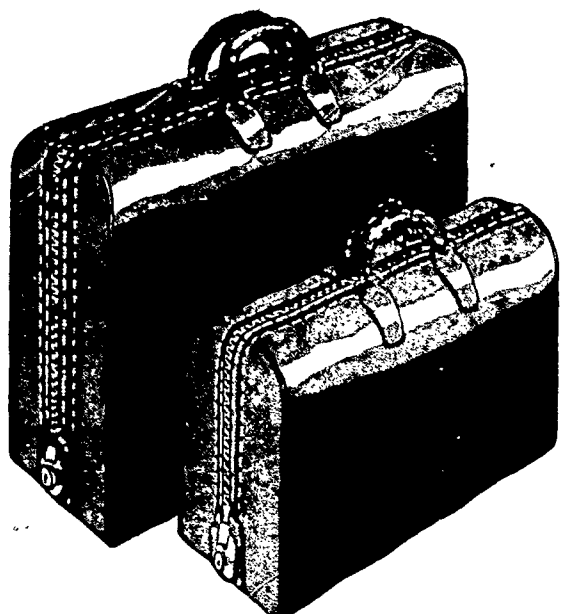
