

Eastern Rite Bishop to Celebrate Outdoor Mass Marking Ukrainian Day

A Pontifical High Mass in the Byzantine-Slavonic rite will be celebrated outdoors by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Constantine Bohachevsky, Bishop of the Ukrainian Catholic Diocese in the United States on Sunday, August 1, in Elser Grove, Chili Ave., Rochester.

The solemn ceremony, unique in the Rochester metropolitan area, will mark Ukrainian Seminary Day for Rochester and surrounding territory. Purpose of the day is to foster vocations to the Holy Priesthood in the Byzantine-Slavonic rite and to raise funds for a proposed Major Seminary in Washington, D. C.

RESPONSES IN the Mass will be sung by Ukrainian choirs of Rochester Syracuse, Auburn and Elmira. A breakfast for the Bishop and visiting dignitaries will follow the Mass.

The day's program will open with a parade from St. Joseph's Church, Hudson Avenue, to the grove. In the afternoon, there will be selections by local and visiting choirs, also athletic contests, games and dancing.

Cooperating in the program are parishoners of St. Joseph's Church, which the Rev. Basil Turin is pastor. All societies affiliated with the church will participate.

While the Mass of the Byzantine-Rite to be celebrated at the outdoor altar will differ from the Latin rite Mass somewhat in ceremony, vestments and gestures,

the essential sacrifice of the Body and Blood of Christ will take place.

The Byzantine-Slavonic Rite, also known as the liturgy of St. John Chrysostom, Archbishop of Constantinople from 397 to 403 A.D., was translated into the old Slavonic tongue in the year 880 A.D. with approval of Pope John VIII, according to the Rev. John J. Scanlon, S.J., of Buffalo, who spoke at the Ukrainian Mass in Elmira Heights on Thanksgiving Day, 1947.

THE RITE IS USED by seven and a half million Catholics in the East and at least a half million in the United States.

Both the Roman and the Byzantine rites offer Christ's Body and Blood as an act of adoration, of thanksgiving, as a means of making satisfaction for sin and for obtaining graces and blessings.

The Seminary for which the observance is being held is St. Joseph's Major Seminary which came into existence in 1941 when the war in Europe had made it impossible for students to attend the seminaries in Rome, Innsbruck, and Western Ukraine located in Washington. The Seminary is affiliated with the Catholic

26 Summer Schools Open In Diocese Teaching Religion With Recreation

More than 850 youngsters are currently enrolled in summer vacation schools in 26 parishes of the Rochester Diocese, enjoying a blend of recreation and the religious training which may be denied many of them during the school year.

Providing a balanced program of instruction and play for children ranging from kindergarten tots to eighth graders, these summer schools are designed to afford public school children an opportunity to study religion.

According to the Rev. Albert H. Schnarky, diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, which supplies the religious projects, the vacation school is the closest approach some Catholic children ever make to the advantages of a parochial school.

This is true particularly in rural areas which are without a parish school. In some of these rural districts the vacation school is able to provide 60 hours religious instruction, more than a child could put in during the course of a whole school year on release time.

THE PROGRAM in most diocesan vacation schools includes art and craft work, songs and games, and outdoor sports in addition to the religious instruction. Pastors, seminarians, Sisters and lay persons are the instructors.

Transportation for the children in rural areas, as well as their summer teachers, is provided by parents, relatives and other lay persons of the parishes.

Many of the schools have registrations of over one hundred pupils, as in Rochester several large parishes have close to 200 students. One of these is St. Patrick's Summer School, which is taught by Sister Lucia of the Missionary Sisters of the Most Holy Trinity, assisted by four Sisters of St. Joseph.

St. Patrick's has four groups of students including kindergarten, 2 and 3 grades, 4 and 5 grades, and 6 and up. Plays, songs and games occupy the tots, who also have a small picnic in Brown's Square. The older children get a varied schedule of assembly, religious coloring, craft work, recreation in St. Patrick's Hall, religious instruction in St. Andrew's Seminary, and baseball in Brown Square. The craft work is slanted to aid religious instruction, with sick-call sets, holy water fonts, plaster plaques and prizes.

Improvements At Holy Cross Set at \$18,000

With the installation of two new side altars and a wrought iron sanctuary railing late in June, the half-year mark in the improvement program was reached, Monsignor Casey said.

MAILED IN the year, rubber kneels, an asphalt tile flooring and two new confessionals were installed in the church. By December of 1948, a new church organ valued at \$5,000 should be in place.

Interior of the convent has been painted and papered and a new plumbing system for church, convent and rectory set up. Painting and decorating is now in process in the interior of the school, classrooms and halls. The modern, fully equipped kindergarten will be ready when school opens in September.
