It is un-American discrimination, against Catholic children, and nothing else, and it means simply that a Catholic parent must pay for fees his rides, free lunches and free health service of his non-Catholic neighbors, while his own children must walk to school, pay for their lunches and doctor's bill.

Talk Rules World, Fr. LeFarge Says

New York—(NC)—"Some may say the interracial movement is just talk, and ask that we are going to accomplish with words. But the truth is, the world is being governed by talk and the public opinion it creates," the Rev. John LaFarge, S.J., editor-in-chief of America, declared at a meeting of the Irish-American Committee for Interracial Justice here.

"We are at a moment now in the history of America and the world when the things we say have tremendous power and significance," the priest, who is chaplain of the Catholic Interracial Council of New York, declared. "We must not forget that the war we are engaged in—the so-called cold war—is a battle of ideas, of ideologies, aimed at capturing the human soul, and that we have a duty at a time when people are wary of words of bitterness to speak words of justice and friendship." James McGurrin, president-general of the American-Irish Historical Society, was chairman of the meeting, which noted the centenary of Daniel O'Connell, Irish statesman frequently praised by American abolitionist leaders for his advocacy of Negro rights.

"Our committee," he said, "has been organized to rally Irish-Americans on the side of the Negro, following the example of O'Connell in his day and of John Boyle O'Reilly, great Irish-American author and editor, three quarters of a century later."

A NEW PROGRAM for the aged will be rushed through the organization's social service department. The convention reaffirmed its stand on the matter of working on a community basis for adequate housing, and on cooperation with the Bishop's Settlement Committee for Dispersed Persons. The group also called for national observance of Good Friday.

The CDA approved gifts of \$9,200 for religious and educational work. Of this \$200 was allotted to the Minnesota State Court for vacation schools, \$2,000 to the Catholic Church Extension Society, \$1,500 to the Oklahoma Missions, \$2,000 to the Missionary Servants of the Holy Trinity, Silver Springs, Md., \$1,500 for each shipment of a scholarship for the education of a negro doctor to work in the Carolina missions and \$1,000 for the new University at Puerto Rico.
