

**Solemn Triduum
To St. Anne
Set at St. Mary**

Auburn—The solemn triduum in honor of St. Anne, the mother of our Blessed Lady, will be held in St. Mary's Church beginning Friday evening, July 23, and concluding Monday with the Masses.

There will be triduum prayers of devotion, a sermon and Benediction Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings at 7:30. Following these devotions there will be veneration of the relic of St. Anne. The Sunday evening triduum will be combined with the Novena devotions.

The Masses on Saturday morning will be at 7:30 and 8:00 o'clock and on Monday morning, the feast of St. Anne, there will be Masses at 6, 7, 8, and 9:00 o'clock.

The devotions are identical with those at the Shrine at Beaupre near Quebec. The triduum makes it possible for those who are interested to unite themselves with the devotions carried on at the famous Shrine at Beaupre even though they cannot attend.

Following the services on Sunday evening, July 25, colored movies of the Shrine at Beaupre and the Saunoy region will be shown in Lyceum Hall.

**26 Summer Schools Open In Diocese
Teaching Religion With Recreation**

More than 850 youngsters are currently enrolled in summer vacation schools in 26 parishes of the Rochester Diocese, enjoying a blend of recreation and the religious training which may be denied many of them during the school year.

Providing a balanced program of instruction and play for children ranging from kindergarten to eighth graders, these summer schools are designed to afford public school children an opportunity to study religion.

According to the Rev. Albert H. Schnacky, diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, which supplies the religious projects, the vacation school is the closest approach some Catholic children ever make to the advantages of a parochial school.

This is true particularly in rural areas which are without a parochial school. In some of these rural districts the vacation school is able to provide 60 hours religious instruction, more than a child could put in during the school year.

THE PROGRAM in most diocesan vacation schools includes art and craft work, songs and games, and outdoor sports in addition to the religious instruction. Pastors, seminarians, Sisters and lay persons are the instructors.

Transportation for the children in rural areas, as well as their summer teachers, is provided by parents, relatives and other lay persons of the parishes.

Many of the schools have registrations of over one hundred pupils, and in Rochester several large parishes have close to 200 students. One of these is St. Patrick's Summer School, which is taught by Sister Lucia of the Missionary Sisters of the Most Holy Trinity, assisted by four Sisters of St. Joseph.

St. Patrick's has four groups of students including kindergarten, 2 and 3 grades, 4 and 5 grades, and 6 and up. Plays, songs and games occupy the tots, who also have a small picnic in Brown's Square. The older children get a varied schedule of assembly, religious coloring, craft work, recreation in St. Patrick's Hall, religious instruction in St. Andrew's Seminary, and baseball in Brown's Square. The craft work is slanted in aid religious instruction, with sick call sets, holy water fonts, plaster plaques and similar articles being fashioned for use in homes.

A COMMUNION breakfast to close the season at St. Patrick's Summer School is being planned.

Other schools participating in the vacation program are St. Francis Assisi, St. Augustine, St. Lucy and Annunciation in Rochester; St. Francis Assisi, Auburn; St. Catherine, Addison; St. Columba, Caledonia; St. Vincent de Paul, Chubbuck; St. Fechin, Chili; St. Felix, Clifton Springs; St. Joseph, Cayuga; St. Charles Borromeo, Elmira Heights; St. Mary, Genesee.

Also, Good Shepherd, Henrietta and St. Joseph's, Rush; St. Leo Hillon, St. Paul of the Cross, Honoree Falls; St. Thomas Aquinas, Leicester; St. Raphael, Pittsford.

**Formula Room,
Paging System
Plans Revealed**

Auburn—A new milk laboratory or "formula" room is now nearing completion at Mercy Hospital, a Community Chest Agency, and will be under the supervision of Sister Francine. The room, equipped with all modern equipment, will be used for the preparation of formulas for infants.

Planned since last January, it is expected to be in operation by the end of July when the last piece of equipment, a sterilizer donated by the Auburn Elks, is delivered. The cost of the much-needed room has been around \$3,000.

ANOTHER ADDITION to the increasing facilities at Mercy Hospital, according to Sister Aurelia, is the Treatment Room, which has been in operation since last February. It fills the need of minor surgery near the maternity and children's ward where simpler operations may be performed without use of the main operating room on the top floor.

The Treatment Room will provide for transfusions for older children and infants' spinal injections and general physical treatments. A new green wall covering is expected to be added to complete the room whenever funds are available. The supervision of this room is also under Sister Francine.

Mercy Hospital is also about to have its new paging system completed with only a few boxes left to be installed. This system, the cost of which was met by the hospital physicians, will provide remote control operation to relieve the usual burden on a switchboard. The system has been obtained through rental agreement with the manufacturer.
