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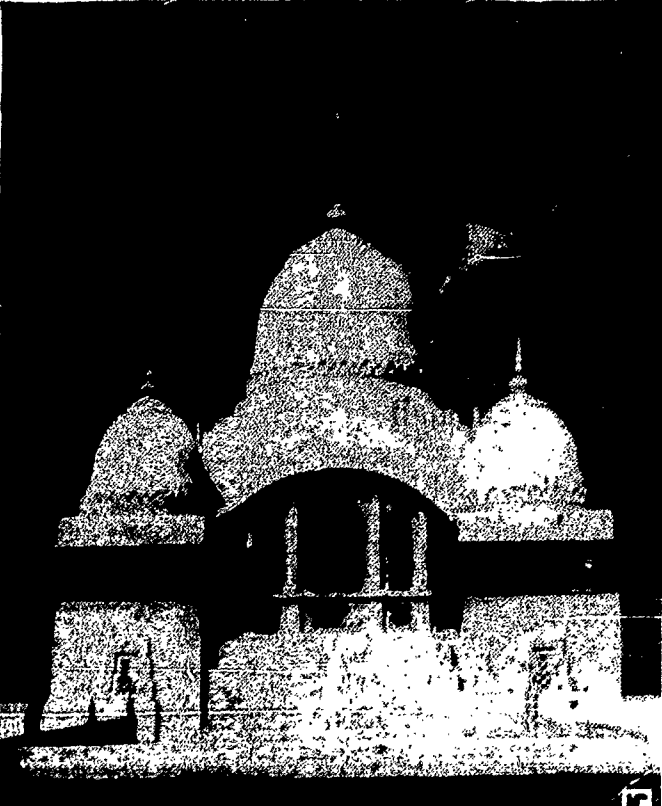
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A SHRINE TO OUR LADY

Today we're 50.8% of the voting population and 28% of the country's labor force. The 1948 Senate Fair Deal bill is a really meaty business when they decried the "repeated injuries and usurpations of the part of men toward women."

Steadily we've made our way into the professions, business and a bit into politics. Clever enterprisers are amassing vast profits each year by calculating and appealing to the tremendous power women possess in modern life. The gains have been great, girls, but so has the total cost of the whole campaign. It almost appears as if there might be such a thing as being too thoroughly and completely successful.
