Geneva—Genevans have stretched charitable "hands across the sea" to aid members of a little war-devastated Catholic Church in Heidelberg, Germany.

Major General Francis B. Wilby (Retired) of St. Clair Street went into action when he received an appeal from a friend, Brig. General Phillip E. Gallagher, director of military posts in Germany.

Major Wilby transmitted the appeal to Genevans, who contributed generously to a fund to assist in rehabilitation work at St. Ann's Church in Heidelberg.

The contributions were taken to the German parish by Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Lynch, South Main Street, who acted as representatives of the local group.

SPECIAL HONORS were paid the Genevans by American officials in Germany and by the congregation of St. Ann's in appreciation of the American assistance.

A Solemn High Mass was celebrated by U. S. Army chaplains, the Reverend William K. Gray, John T. Schaeff and Richard Hausler, director of German Catholic churches for the Heidelberg area.

The Mass was in thanksgiving for those who had donated aid. Members of the German parish have volunteered to donate their labor toward the rehabilitation work.

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Nazareth College To Offer Variable Evening Courses

An enlarged program of evening courses will be offered by Nazareth College next Fall with the addition of many cultural and scientific studies not previously offered, college authorities have announced.

Extension subjects range from literature and language studies to radio and business classes, according to the schedule which will be announced later.

Among the projected courses, a study of Political Problems will take up taxing non-profit activities, basic obligations of government, learning government by participation and training for political service.

ANOTHER CLASS, Current Problems in Social Living, will discuss modern life from the sociological, the psychological and theological angles.

Other classes will be formed in Religion, Philosophy, Psychology, English Composition, Journalism, Radio, Education, History, Modern Languages, and Literature.

Music Appreciation, Art Appreciation, and Business, including Accounting, Business Law, Business English and Economics, will also be offered.

Red Judges Give Priest Four Years
 London, NC—A military tribunal in Katowice has sentenced the Rev. Michael Nerek to four years in prison on charges of opposition to communism and incitement against the present Polish regime, according to the Inter-Catholic Press Agency here.

Father Nerek is a repatriate from eastern Poland, which has been incorporated into Soviet territory. He has been pastor in the village of Krzyzowa, Lower Silesia. The priest's mother and brother died in Siberia. At his trial he admitted that having suffered many personal injuries at the hands of the Russians he lacked sympathy with Russia. As a Catholic priest, he said, he could not approve atheistic communism. Charged with having organized prayers for Poles who died during exile in Siberia, he said he felt it was a duty to pray for the dead and saw nothing wrong in requesting such prayers.

Chinese Children Aided By Mobile Clinic
 Shanghai, RN—A church-sponsored health center on wheels has completed its first four months of operation, having aided 2,000 boys and girls in nine institutions.

Originator of the clinic is the Rev. Frederick A. McGuire of the National Catholic Welfare Conference. Aiding in its operation are the Canadian Aid to China Committee and United Service to China, which includes a Protestant relief agency.

Pastor Turns Over Anniversary Gifts
 A sum of \$3,000 given to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas F. Connors in anniversary gifts has been turned over by Monsignor Connors to the fund for the new Blessed Sacrament Youth Center.

The Blessed Sacrament pastor announced his intention to speed construction of the Youth Center with his own contribution in "The Parish Weekly," publication of the Oxford Street church. Approximately \$3,500 was donated to him in golden jubilee remembrances at the time of his ordination anniversary celebration last June.

He paid tribute to the generosity of the parishioners and friends and parish societies who had contributed to his anniversary gifts. Construction of the new center will start next year.
