Nazareth College To Offer Variable Evening Courses

An enlarged program of evening courses will be offered by Nazareth College next fall with the addition of many cultural and scientific studies.

Extension subjects range from literature and language studies to radio and business classes, according to the schedule which will be announced later.

Among the projected courses, a study of Political Problems will take up taking non-profit activities, basic obligations of government, learning government by participation and training for political service.

Another class, Current Problems in Social Living, will discuss modern life from the sociological, the psychological and theological angles.

Other classes will be formed in Religion, Philosophy, Psychology, English Composition, Journalism, Radio, Education, History, Modern Languages, and Literature.

Music Appreciation, Art Appreciation, and Business, including Accounting, Business Law, Business English and Economics, will also be offered.

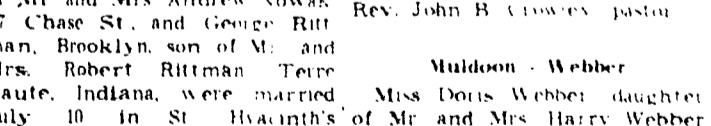

Christ instituted one priesthood; what's the difference between a secular priest and an order priest?

It is true that Christ instituted only one priesthood. It is also true that there is a difference between a secular priest and an order priest. This difference however is not one which affects their priesthood. It is a difference extrinsic to the priesthood. An order priest is a priest who belongs to a society or religious institute approved by ecclesiastical authority.

As a member of this society he takes vows according to the special laws of the society. The vows are generally those of chastity, obedience and poverty. These vows may be either perpetual or temporal but to be renewed when they expire.

The secular priest does not however belong to such a society. He does take the vow of perfect chastity at ordination. He does not however take vows of poverty or obedience. He does not take a vow of property for he is to provide for his own necessities, this requires an income from which he can save enough to provide for possible years of sickness.

The order priest by his vow of poverty renounces all personal income; the order provides for his necessary food and clothing. The priest as such is the minister of divine worship especially in its highest act, namely, sacrifice, the sacrifice of the Mass. This power along with the power to confer the sacraments is given to the priest in his ordination. Thus one can readily see that the above priestly powers granted alike to both order and secular priest is in no way affected by his taking a vow of poverty or adoption of a rule of life.

In a somewhat similar way a man who is clothed in a suit and overcoat is not a different kind of man from the one clothed merely in a suit. The addition of another garment does not affect the man as such.

Soviet Zone Has Most German Protestants

Hamburg, Germany — (RNS) —Forty-four per cent of German Protestants live in the Russian Zone of Occupation according to the latest ecclesiastical census, which upsets previous estimates. Of the 40,000,000 Protestants, 17,500,000 are in the Russian Zone. The remainder are scattered throughout the three western occupational areas. The American Zone is primarily Roman Catholic while the British is mainly Protestant.

The influx of refugees from the east increased the total Protestant population of the Soviet Zone 24.6 per cent and the Western Zones 25.8 per cent.

Red Judges Give Priest Four Years

London—A military tribunal in Katowice has sentenced the Rev. Michael Norek to four years in prison on charges of opposition to communism and intemperate against the present Polish regime, according to the Inter-Catholic Press Agency here.

Father Norek is a repatriate from eastern Poland, which has been incorporated into Soviet territory. He has been pastor in the village of Krzywizna, Lower Silesia.

The priest's mother and brother died in Siberia. At his trial he admitted that having suffered many personal injuries at the hands of the Russians he lacked sympathy with Russia. As a Catholic priest, he said, he could not approve atheistic communism. Charged with having organized prayers for Poles who died during exile in Siberia, he said he felt it was a duty to pray for the dead and saw nothing wrong in requesting such prayers.
