### Schools Here To Adopt Study Plan

A new project — the adaptation of principles of Christian social living to the social studies of geography, history and citizenship — will be introduced in elementary schools this fall in the dioceses of Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse, Ogdensburg and Albany.

At the request of the Bishops of the five northern New York dioceses, the course of studies was planned by some 30 teaching Religious of 18 communities. Ultimate goal of the program is a uniform course of studies for Catholic elementary schools, based on the curriculum "Guiding Growth of Christian Social Living," a three-volume work by Sisters Mary Joan, O.P., and Mary Nonn, O.P., of the Commission on American Citizenship at the Catholic University, Washington, D. C.

Introduction of the course this year was decided at a six-week curriculum workshop sponsored here by the New York State Council of Catholic School Superintendents.
