Jesuit Says Laity Failing Needs of Radio-Movie Apostolate

Brooklyn — (NC) — The Catholic laity are failing to take full advantage of films and radio to promote Christian teaching, the Rev. Harold C. Gardner, S. J., literary editor of America, told a Catholic Film and Radio forum held here.
The Jesuit pointed out that 17 cities now have Catholic news broadcasts and there are four Catholic radio stations which would welcome such broadcasts and do not have them.
He said priests are bearing the principal burden of devising and presenting such broadcasts, but there is a lack of cooperation by the laity.
"The boy or girl who can play the piano," the school class that can present acceptable dramatic presentations, young men and women who can prepare scripts on Catholic subjects or with Catholic backgrounds are needed sadly and are not to be found," Father Gardner said.
Other speakers included the Rev. Anthony I. Russo-Aloni, S. J. of New York, a leader in the Boy Saviour movement; Dr. Edward I. Fenlon, who is leaving Brooklyn College to join the faculty of Loyola College, Baltimore; Una O'Connor, stage and movie star, and Daniel E. Doran, chairman of the Catholic Film and Radio Guild.
Speaking from the viewpoint of an educator with 35 years experience, Dr. Fenlon stressed the necessity for a study of new means of communications, including television, by Catholic educators if they hope to keep abreast of the times.
Mr. Doran said that Philadelphia, through use of the radio, and Springfield, Ill., through use of films, were bright spots in the Catholic news fields.

Catholic Women in Tokyo Raise Funds for Hospital

Tokyo — (NC) — Less than a year after its founding, the Catholic Women's Club here has nearly raised the million yen needed for a new wing at the Sakaramuchi Tuberculosis Sanitarium in Tokyo.
The women, many of them trained social workers eager to lend their knowledge to the betterment of Catholic life in the capital, gathered at the GHQ Chapel Center to create an organization whose function would be "to acquaint the members with Catholic Action in Japan and to promote their social activities."
THIS INTENT swiftly broadened until the club became one of Tokyo's more important agencies for assisting institutions and needy individuals.
Among other accomplishments in the group's brief life have been: 1) distribution of 6,000 Christmas packages to children in orphanages and slum areas; 2) receipt of hundreds of packages containing food, clothing and medicine, from more than 500 letters sent to friends and relatives in the States; 3) provision of much equipment and medical supplies to institutions unable to purchase it.
On the social welfare side, the club has done a great deal to widen the activities of its own center, with Catechetical and English classes for adults and children.

THE LEPROSARIUM has been materially helped to speed its day of self-sustenance. Throughout this activity, the individual has not been neglected — one poignant instance was the assistance given Japanese women to open a dress shop on the Ginza (Tokyo) Fifth Avenue) so they might support their families.
The Rev. L. N. Tibesar, M.M., national director for Catholic Charities and supervisor of the Catholic Club for Japanese, is advisor to the officers, Mrs. Edward P. Monaghan, president; Mrs. William Arty, secretary, and Mrs. Stewart Williams, treasurer. Membership is open to any Catholic woman in the Occupation.

Two Films Available For Catholic Groups

Two new motion pictures, produced by J. Arthur Rank, the English producer, will be released Wednesday, Sept. 15, by the Catholic Dramatic Movement for showings in Catholic auditoriums.
"The Velvet Touch," one of the new films, is the story of a boy who loses his nerve as a school athlete, but regains it in a series of circus adventures. The plot is portrayed not in words, but in actions.
Another movie, "Jean's Plan," dramatizes the adventures of a young girl with robbers and criminals. Excitement and suspense are created as the girl, aided by her father, chases and captures the robbers.

JAPAN BOOK CRITICS NAMED

Tokyo — (NC) — Because of last winter's difficulty involving certain Japanese school texts expressing anti-Christian sentiment, General MacArthur has named a committee of three to scan all future publications for objectionable sections.
The Ministry of Education late last year issued a history of Europe which contained many references derogatory to Christianity and particularly to the Catholic Church. Investigation showed that it had been approved as written by a liaison section of the Occupation's Educational Department and for a time General MacArthur himself was presumed to have known about references.
When the General, who has frequently extolled Christianity as an inseparable element and even the keystone of democracy itself, learned of the matter he directed Dr. Herbert L. Searns, director of education, National Commission of Christians and Jews, chairman; the Rev. P. J. Gleghrich, Catholic Chaplain of the Far East Air Force, and the Rev. William G. Shure, Protestant Chief of Chaplains for the Eighth Army.

One of the committee's first actions was to take under advisement publication of a new history of the Western World. By Ministry of Education custom, most text-books for schools are issued in new editions annually.
