Among committees suggested for each Society are: Membership, programs, social and public relations, and radio. Members are urged to attend all parish association groups, and youth activities.

Rallying around their shepherd, His Eminence Conrad Cardinal von Preysing, 35,000 Berlin Catholics flocked to the Sylvan Theatre to dedicate themselves to the Sacred Heart in an impressive ceremony. Central Union To Hold State Meet At Schenectady

Rochester's delegation to the annual convention of New York State Branch, Catholic Central Union of America in Schenectady will leave by special coach, New York Central Station, Saturday, Sept. 4 at 6:13 a. m.
Secretary Charles Mura of the Rochester branch will be in charge.
The convention call to area delegates has come from state president Bernard F. Jansen of Brooklyn. The convention is scheduled for Sept. 4, 5 and 6, over the Labor Day weekend.
In his convention letter, the state president declares:
"FOR GUIDANCE and inspiration for our deliberations, we confirm the choice of our parent organizations by using this motto:
"The great hour of Christian conscience has struck. His Holiness Pius XII declared in his 1948 Easter message. This conscience will either become fully aware of its mission to a mankind whose spiritual values are in danger and save it, thus fulfilling Christ's words: 'Have faith. I have conquered the world.' Or if it is but half awake and does not courageously give itself to Christ then Christ's terrible verdict: 'Who is not with Me is against Me; will become operative."
The admonitions set forth by the Holy Father devolves upon us a duty that we can neither shun nor overlook. Let us join then in unflinching and fervent efforts to carry out the wishes of our Spiritual Leader, Christ's Vicar on Earth by your presence at the Schenectady convention."
