**Chinese Bandits Emulate 'Robin Hood'**  
**Maryknoll Nun Reports On Return**

"Robin Hood" has come to China, according to Sister Mary Magdalena Urlacher, Maryknoll Sister who has just returned to Rochester after 13 years in the missions of Kaying, China.

This was related by the Maryknoll mission nun in an interview with the Very Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director in the Society for the Propagation of the Faith office, Columbus Civic Center, Friday.

Sister Magdalena was a member of Our Lady of Perpetual

Help parish in Rochester and a graduate of its parochial school, as well as of Nazareth Academy. She entered Maryknoll in 1929. In 1934, she became a registered nurse and the following year shipped for her assignment in Kaying.

**THE MISSIONARY SISTERS** is presently visiting at the home of her brother, George Urlacher, 53 Chimayo Road, Irondequoit. Another brother John, lives at 63 Chimayo Road. A reception will be held in Our Lady of Perpetual Help hall Sunday, Sept. 5 from 3 to 5 p. m. for her friends, relatives and neighbors.

The tactics of the modern-day Chinese banditry, Sister Magdalena reported, smack of the old Robin Hood tradition — robbing the rich and giving to the poor. Although there is no organized Communism in the Kaying vicariate, the bandits achieve the same effect by looting the wealthy land-owners and dividing the spoils among the poor.

One of the Maryknoll Sisters under Bishop Francis X. Ford, M. M., who engaged in direct evangelical work, Sister Magdalena was stationed in what is known as a "two-sister house." From these houses, the Sisters go out one at a time and do the most primitive pioneering, sometimes spending days in the homes of pagans.

Just how effective the two-sister system really is can be judged from Sister Magdalena's record. With her partner, she accounted for over 2,000 conversions in her 13 years in the field.

**ON ONE OCCASION**, Sister recalled, a young boy came to her begging her to come to his home. According to the boy's wishes, the nun went down to the house and spent some days with the family. The trip resulted in 20 baptisms.

Another vital part of her job was training native Sisters to take over the catechetical work in the village of their district. At the present time there are 16 native Sisters in the sector, 11 of whom are professed, doing the same work.

Throughout her years in the Kaying missions there was al-

ways hardship and poverty. Much suffering was caused by shortage of food, induced by floods, droughts, war and inflation. During the war years, although they never actually starved, their insufficient diet consisted chiefly of native foods and rice.

**ON HER WAY HOME**, the missioner was aboard a Swatow river boat which was boarded by Communists wearing blue uniforms with a red star on the cap and armed with machine guns. The nuns completely cowed the 60 passengers and extorted \$5,000, 000 in Chinese tax money from the frightened travelers, but did not molest the nuns.

Sister Magdalena visualized a hopeful future for the Chinese missions. One of the chief factors in the growth of the Church will be native clergy and sisterhood which is being fostered by the Maryknollers led by Bishop Ford. On July 16 of this year, 16 Chinese priests, all brought up during the Bishop's pontificate, were ordained. The young aspirants go to the junior seminary, which is staffed with Chinese and headed by Father Tschong, successor to the Rt. Rev. Charles Hilbert, M. M. of Rochester. Theology and philosophy are taught at the Jesuit Seminary at Hong Kong.

Bishop Ford is also building a cathedral in Kaying which he hopes to have completed next year.

**Holy Land Convents Reported Damaged**

Amman, Transjordan — (NC) — While the Holy Land war, which erupted just three months ago, has left many of the Catholic churches and convents ruined and looted, the actual shrines have thus far been almost providentially spared from major damage. The second UN truce is now undergirding its severest strains as bitter fighting flares up repeatedly in Jerusalem. Though endangered by nearby shelling, the Dominican Church of St. Stephen has remained unharmed. However the neighboring Anglican Cathedral of St. George was damaged.
