

**State Verein
Units Pick 2
From Rochester**

Every effort should be made by members to preserve the Released Time Religious Instruction program as it exists in New York State, the New York State Branches, Catholic Central Union (Verein) and National Catholic Women's Union declared in resolution adopted at the State convention held in Schenectady over the Labor Day weekend.

Two Rochesterians, Mrs. Anna Fuehrer and Joseph H. Gervais were honored by election to state offices. Mrs. Fuehrer was elected third vice president of the New York State Branch, National Catholic Women's Union and Gervais was named fourth vice president of the Catholic Central Union, the men's organization.

The Rochester branches invited the state organization to convene in Rochester in 1949.

HIS EXCELLENCY, the Most Rev. Edmund F. Gibbons, Bishop of Albany presided at the Solemn High Mass in St. Joseph's Church, Schenectady, Sunday and addressed the delegates at the dinner. The Bishop of Albany stressed the need in this day of materialism for organizations to spread spiritual ideas and to advance Catholic Action such as the two in convention.

In other resolutions the Catholic Union offered advice to laboring Pope Pius XII's address to working men of Italy in which they were urged to be temperate at all times, to be thrifty, to turn away from enjoyment of worldly things to the exclusion of the spiritual.

Concern was shown for displaced persons, prisoners of war and expellees in war torn lands. Members were asked to urge the U. S. Government to assist wherever possible and members were called upon to practice heroic charity in assisting unfortunate people of Europe.

Rochester's delegation of 40 men and women was headed by August Maler, men's president and Mrs. Louise Aman, president of the women's group.

Mrs. Mary Neubauer, of Albany was elected president of the State Branch, National Catholic Women's Union. Bernard Jansen, of Brooklyn and all other officers of the men's state branch were re-elected.

Listed To Talk
Columbus Day**

Solemn Pontifical Mass in St. Joseph's Church, Rochester and a banquet at Seneca Hotel in the evening are being planned as a Columbus Day observance by Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus according to Grand Knight John J. Kinney.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, former state chaplain will celebrate the Mass at 9:30 a. m. with priest members assisting. The Rev. Arthur E. Ratigan, council chaplain has charge of church arrangements.

SPEAKER at the dinner, this year, will be Kings County Surrogate Francis D. McGarey, a papal knight, and outstanding Catholic layman of the Brooklyn diocese. General Chairman Leo F. Rombaut, past grand knight, announces.

Judge McGarey was made a knight in the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre in April of this year. He had been made a Knight of Malta in 1943. Both Papal honors were received in recognition of his notably generous and zealous promotion of the works of religion, education and charity.

Born in Brooklyn and graduated by Fordham Law School in 1944, he served as Justice of the Supreme Court from 1940 to 1942.

CHAIRMAN of the Bishop's Lay Committee for Charity, Judge McGarey is chairman of the New York State Council, Knights of Lay Retreat Committee. He is a trustee of Transfiguration Church, Brooklyn, St. Catherine's Hospital, St. John's University, and Ozanam Hall.

A past grand knight of Loyola Council, K. of C., the Surrogate is a life member of the Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum as well as the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

He is a past president and director of several Irish American societies including the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick.

Among his other honors, the Judge received the Catholic action medal of the Brooklyn Alumni Sodality in 1944 and holds honorary degrees from Fordham and St. John's Universities.

Plans for the observance were outlined to Council members last night by Chairman Rombaut who announced Richard H. Torrey as reservation chairman.

**Our 2 Seminaries
Opened With 408
Students Enrolled**

St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries enrolled 408 students from the Diocese of Rochester and nearly a dozen other eastern dioceses as they opened this week to resume the training of young men for the priesthood.

Crowded with a record registration of 220 students in the high school and college courses, St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary began its 78th year looking forward to a new home in buildings expected to rise on Buffalo Road within the next year.

ST. BERNARD'S Seminary beginning its 58th year with a new rector, the Rt. Rev. Magr. Wilfrid T. Craugh, appointed last week to succeed the Rt. Rev. Magr. J. Francis Goggin, P.A., welcomed the largest entering class in its history—63 students from seven different dioceses. Twenty-one of the rat year group are from the Diocese of Rochester.

The total major seminary enrollment of 188 students covers only five classes this year instead of the usual six because the war-time acceleration of studies wiped out one whole student-year.

Eight different dioceses are represented in the student body of St. Andrew's Seminary. To accommodate the students from other dioceses and those of the Rochester diocese whose homes are outside the city, the Seminary residence hall, St. William House on the Buffalo Road, has stretched its accommodations to care for 90 boys.
