Fr. Kelly Tells Fatima Story To C. C. Rosarians

Transformation of religious life in many sections of Portugal where the people have heeded the message of Our Lady for daily recitation of the Rosary was described by the Rev. Leonard A. Kelly on Sept. 1 in Corpus Christi Church hall, Rochester. More than 100 members of the Rosary Society heard Father Kelly pastor of St. James Church, Trumansburg, who returned recently from an air pilgrimage to Fatima, Portugal, scene of several apparitions of the Blessed Mother. The priest showed colored slides taken on the pilgrimage. Members of the Rosary Society ended a drive for 500 articles of clothing for Europe this week. The clothing will be shipped to the "Pope's Storehouse."

Priest Lists Items Needed For Europe Aid

Necessity of prayer for and continued interest in the plight of starving Europe was stressed this week by the Rev. John T. Callahan, chaplain of Our Lady of Mercy High School.

"The need continues great," Father Callahan stated. Reminding that many Catholic parishes and schools are conducting regular continuing campaigns for relief articles, Father Callahan urged Catholics to call the schools if they have any donations of articles or money for postage. Addresses of needy Europeans also will be supplied, he added. He listed the following principal needs:

- To Keep Them Alive — fat, flour, sugar.
- To Keep Them Clean and Neat — 2 sheets, pillow cases, 2 Turkish towels, 2 dish towels, toothbrush, soap, shaving cream, pins, needles, black and white thread, thimble, hooks, buttons, safety pins, pencils.
- To Keep Them Warm — woolen undershirt, union suit, woolen stockings and socks, cap and shawl, woolen gloves or mittens, flannel nightshirt, blankets, warm slippers, Oxford or sport shoes, knitting wool for pullover sweaters plus knitting needles.
- To Make Them Happy — coffee, tea, cocoa, chocolate, spam, sardines, rice, powdered egg, dehydrated or condensed milk, nuts, dried fruit, hard candies, cigarettes.

Our 2 Seminaries Opened With 408 Students Enrolled

St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries enrolled 408 students from the Diocese of Rochester and nearby a dozen other eastern dioceses as they opened this week to resume the training of young men for the priesthood.

Crowded with a record registration of 220 students in the high school and college courses, St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary began its 79th year looking forward to a new home in buildings expected to rise on Buffalo Road within the next year.

ST. BERNARD'S Seminary beginning its 55th year with a new rector, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfrid T. Craugh, appointed last week to succeed the Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. Francis Goggin, P.A., welcomed the largest entering class in its history—63 students from seven different dioceses. Twenty-one of the 1st year group are from the Diocese of Rochester.

The total major seminary enrollment of 185 students covers only five classes this year instead of the usual six because the war-time acceleration of students wiped out one whole student-year. Eight different dioceses are represented in the student body of St. Andrew's Seminary. To accommodate the students from other dioceses and those of the Rochester diocese whose homes are outside the city, the Seminary residence hall, St. William House on the Buffalo Road, has stretched its accommodations to care for 90 boys.

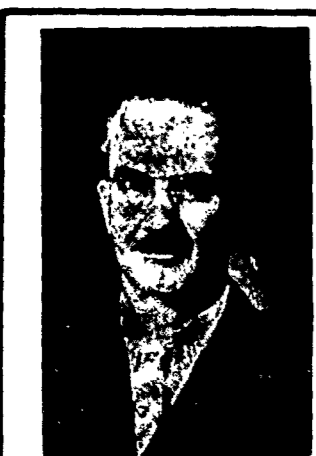
Parish School In 92nd Year

"The Sisters of Charity have lately begun an Orphanage Academy and Free School at St. Peter & Paul's in Elmira."

Thus, read an item in the "Buffalo Catholic Sentinel" on Sept. 26, 1857. This week — more than nine decades later — the Rev. William J. Naughton, pastor, announced the 92nd opening of the parish school. In making the announcement he declared: "For nearly a century our parent church has espoused the cause of Catholic education in this city. Hundreds of graduates in that time have been trained to take their places in various activities of life, prepared not only to be good citizens, but what is more essential, good Catholics."
