Auburn — An American Legion National Commander's scholarship in the amount of \$1,200 was awarded to Donald B. Riestler, 87 Steel street, this city, at the annual Department of New York convention in Saratoga Springs last week.

Riestler was the guest of the Legion at the convention, according to Mrs. Charles W. Hudson, chairman of education of orphans of veterans, American Legion, W. Mynderse Rise Auxiliary, Unit No. 97, Presentation made by National Vice Commander Cree.

Riestler is a graduate of St. Mary's Parochial School and East High School, and he is now attending LeMoyne College at Syracuse. He was one of 14 candidates from the area which includes New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia, also the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. Out of 64 applicants from New York State Riestler was the only successful candidate.

 Postmaster Donald A. Dailey announces the following additions in mail service to the American, British and French zones of Germany, excluding Berlin.

Printed matter, including newspapers, catalogs, periodicals, books, prospectuses, and similar commercial literature weight limit 6 pounds, 9 ounces, rate 1½ cents for each 2 ounces.

Registration and Special Delivery services are available for letters and other regular mail articles (except parcel post), 25¢ 20¢ for either service in addition to the regular postage. Articles sent Special Delivery must bear the "Express Label" (Form 297) or plainly marked in red ink "Express."
