**Greek Law Hits  
Religious Press**

Athena (RNS) — An order is-  
sued by the Ministry of Finance  
has made it illegal to import into  
Greece any religious publication  
unless the name of the denomina-  
tion or sect is stamped on each  
piece of literature.

Violators will be liable to six  
months' imprisonment and a fine  
of 100,000 drachmas, the ministry  
announcement said.

Jehovah's Witnesses, the order  
said, must stamp on their pub-  
lication one of the following "Her-  
esy of the Thousandists," "Her-  
esy of Jehovah's Witnesses," or  
"Heresy of Students of the Scriptures."

Exempt from the law are all  
volumes which contain the teach-  
ings of the Orthodox Church, and  
all hymn books and prayer books  
used during the religious services  
of every other denomination.

**Fordham University  
Adds Polish Courses**

New York — (NC) — Courses  
in Polish literature and stylistics  
have been added to the curricu-  
lum at Fordham University, the  
Rev. Robert I. Gannon, president,  
announces. The courses will be in  
the graduate school of arts and  
sciences, beginning in September.

Dr. Teodor F. Domaradzki, un-  
til recently professor of Slavic  
languages at the Gregorian Uni-  
versity in Rome, and also of the  
Polish language at the state uni-  
versity there, will give the  
courses. Basic lectures will be in  
Polish, with commentaries, com-  
plements and stylistic exercises in  
English by Dr. Winczylaw J.  
Wagner.

Establishment of the courses  
came through the efforts of the  
American Polish Citizens Intel-  
lectual Committee, Forham, long  
headquarters for the Lubin Uni-  
versity-in-exile, was chosen be-  
cause of its distinguished record  
of perpetuating the cultures of  
oppressed peoples.

**Two Oxford Students Drive  
'Jalopy' to Rome and Back**

London (NC) A ramshackle,  
\$20, 1926 automobile was lowered  
gently onto the quay side at the  
South England pier of Dover after  
surviving a 3,000 mile road pil-  
grimage to Rome and back. The  
car, driven by two Oxford Uni-  
versity undergraduates, was  
solemnly blessed by a basing  
priest before it began its  
journey to the south coast,  
across the English channel by  
steamer then through France  
via the Lizeux shrine, over the  
steep Swiss Alps down to Rome.

**THE PILGRIMS**, John Day 22,  
and Francis Hearcroft 23 set out  
from Oxford in mid-July. A flag  
bearing a pilgrim cross fluttered  
from the roof.

A back wheel fell off seven  
miles outside Dover but the pil-  
grims managed to reach the boat  
a few minutes before it sailed.  
Customs officers were too as-  
tonished to carry out their  
duties," Mr. Hearcroft said.

In France we were met with  
good-chained questions like  
"Are you taking it to the museum?"  
We visited a garage every day  
for the first fortnight except  
near Lizeux where St. Teresa  
kept us on the road for two  
whole days.

We slept in barn cowsheds  
or on haystacks. Heavy rain for  
hours emptied in blue smoke  
from our damaged wheel.  
"We met with Communist jeers in  
Genoa and Rome but this was  
forgotten under the immense  
kindness shown by French and  
Italians. They would fill the car  
with fruit and cheese, back their  
laughter with as fast speed on  
our journey to Italy.

What is so extraordinary is  
that under the Sign of the Cross  
we returned to England in our  
museum piece. We thought it  
would be necessary to sell it for  
scrap in France or Italy."

**Priest Is Casualty  
Of Holy Land War**

Jerusalem (NC) — Another  
priest has become a casualty of  
the Palestine fighting as he was  
killed in the old city as the  
recently imposed UN truce suf-  
fered its severest strain through-  
out a midnight to dawn battle  
with guns and artillery.

Two other priests were re-  
ported killed in the fighting in  
May. The Rev. John Sackin,  
pastor of St. Peter's, and the  
Rev. Assamphus Sgarbi, a  
priest, both were killed in  
Jerusalem.

The latest casualty, Father  
Hole, a Belgian priest, was killed  
in the hospital conducted by the  
St. Charles Bertram Sisters,  
just south of Jerusalem.

Death resulted from the ex-  
plosion of a bomb dropped on  
the fighting. The bomb blew  
off the priest's legs as he was  
walking in the garden of the hos-  
pital.

**Archbishop Arata Dies**

Vatican City (NC) — Arch-  
bishop Antonio Arata, Assessor  
of the Sacred Congregation for  
the Oriental Church since 1941,  
and prior to that Papal Nuncio  
to Latvia and Estonia, has died  
here at the age of 81. He was re-  
garded as one of the church's  
leading experts on religious mat-  
ters in Soviet Russia.

The prelate, a native of Placen-  
za, Italy, was consecrated Titular  
Archbishop of Sami and made  
Nuncio to the Baltic countries in  
1933. He was member of the  
four-person Pontifical Commis-  
sion for Russia set up by Pope  
Pius XI in 1930.
