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### Divine Word Fathers Plan Hemlock Lake Novitiate

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Honorary deacons will be the Very Rev. Robert Hunter, S.V.D., provincial of the eastern province of the Society and the Rev. Vincent Smith, S.V.D., Masters of Ceremonies will be Rev. John E. Maney and Very Rev. Casimir Murawski, S.V.D.

ESTABLISHED in Holland in 1875, the Society of the Divine Word is a missionary group which maintains colleges, seminaries and mission stations all over the world. Over 1,800 priests and 2,000 brothers work in China, Japan, the Philippine Islands, New Guinea, Australia, Dutch East Indies, Africa, India and South America.

In the United States the Society has a personnel of over 900 priests, brothers and students. They work among the Negro people in eight dioceses, maintain nine seminaries and 24 mission parishes.

In 1928 the Society purchased property from the Diocese of Rochester which had previously been the summer villa of Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid on the hills overlooking Hemlock Lake. A small group of lay brothers cultivated the fields and vineyards of the estate until the present Mission House was erected in September, 1937 as a preparatory seminary for the Society with fifteen students in the original class.

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From the White House, Dr. Lippard was informed by Charles G. Ross, secretary to President Truman, that Taylor's mission "would be terminated when peace is made." Ross said this will "remain the President's policy, and will be strictly adhered to so long as he is in office."

The reply from Gov. Thomas E. Dewey stated that "there are many questions of administrative policy which an incoming President cannot and should not decide until after he takes office."

Henry A. Wallace said he opposed the appointment of a personal ambassador to the Vatican. "It seems to me," he said, "that a country like the United States, which has taken a very special stand with regard to the separation of Church and State, should hardly give this kind of recognition to one Church without giving similar recognition to all Churches."

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### Father Junipero Serra Cause For Canonization Studied

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SEVEN YEARS of painstaking investigation have gone into the possible beatification and canonization of the Rev. Junipero Serra, father of the California mission system. While here, Father Antonelli surveyed the results of the investigation, and offered advice on the court process which will begin in Fresno some time in November.

Some 7,500 pages of the missionary's writings - including his diary, sermons and lectures on philosophy - have been accumulated by the Revs. Eric O'Brien, O.F.M., vice postulator of the Serra cause, Maynard Gelger, O.F.M., Magr. James H. Cullen, J.C.D., and Professor Herbert E. Bolton, of the University of California. Fathers Gelger, Monsignor Cullen and Professor Bolton constitute the diocesan historical commission.

THE VARIOUS legal processes to be carried out by the diocesan court will start with the issuance of an edict by the bishop, calling upon all who have Serra documents to surrender them, or certified copies, to the court for consideration.

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(5) The task of religious commissions attached to the Action Committees is not to cooperate with the Catholic Church but to gain the power to make decisions without the Church and against it.

(6) Closest cooperation with the Czechoslovak State Church is essential. Its Bishops should participate at all State functions and should be accorded the greatest honors.

(7) It is necessary to emphasize the existing religious disharmony within the nation and to stress the need for unity. In the first stages of this program the unifying force of the Czechoslovak National Church is to be used, and in its later phases cooperation with the Orthodox Church is to be stressed. (Prague is to be raised to Orthodox Metropolitan status.)

(8) In the fight against the Church and the priests it is necessary to use all available and time-honored weapons, such as attacking celibacy, economic matters, questions of Church and capitalism, and especially questions as to moral character, after the priests have been discredited by well-prepared bait.

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
