Funeral of Mrs. Margaret Kennedy, sister of Sister Marie of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Rochester, was held Saturday, Sept. 18, 1948 in St. Mary's Church, Medina. Mrs. Kennedy, widow of Patrick J. Kennedy, died Wednesday, Sept. 15 in Our Lady of Victory Hospital, Lackawanna.

Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by her son, the Rev. Joseph A. Kennedy, assisted by the Rev. Leo Kinn, deacon, the Very Rev. Henry B. Shaw, subdeacon, and the Rev. Joseph O'Connor as master of ceremonies.
