Show Draws One Year Ban On Bad Movie

Wilmington, Del.—(NC)—A one year boycott of a neighborhood theater has been pledged by the Catholics of Wilmington following the theater owner's refusal to observe the 75th anniversary of the sodality's founding. Contestants were invited to pay tribute to the Blessed Virgin in prose and verse.

The film which precipitated the ban was "Mom and Dad," a sex-education drama.

Since the theater involved is situated in an overwhelmingly Catholic neighborhood, the management was asked to cancel the showing of the objectionable film. When they persisted, an announcement was made of the voluntary ban on Catholic patronage of the theater.

Priests in several churches in the area of the movie-house are making week-by-week announcements of the fact and have arranged with another theater manager to give children an opportunity to see approved pictures at special matinees.

IN A LETTER to local pastors, the Rev. J. Francis Tucker, O.S.F.S., Wilmington diocesan director of the Legion of Decency, declared that not only had the owner refused to cancel showing of the picture, after he was aware of objections to it but had distributed throughout the city leaflets claiming that Catholic priests endorsed it.

The theater manager declared that an attempt had been made to cancel the picture, but that attorneys for the producers called upon the theater owner and confronted him with the alternative of a lawsuit if he didn't fulfill his booking contract.

Security with God NBC Radio Theme

New York—(NC)—"The Age of Anxiety" might well be the label the historians will pin on the present time for "anxiety" never before have men talked more about security, "longed more for security, and felt so insecure," according to the Rev. Edmund D. Benard, of the Catholic University of America.

His address, first in a series of nine on the union of men with Christ the King was carried by the NBC Catholic Hour.

The explosion of the atom bomb and with it the sudden awareness that America is no longer invulnerable to attack is one cause of inner unrest, Father Benard said, but not the basic one.

The real root of present trouble, he declared, is adoption of the false premise of secularism, through which it is thought we could find peace in possessions in science and technology in wealth and power and military might.

Christopher Group Names Five Patrons

New York—(NC)—The Christopher Movement has been placed under the patronage of the Little Flower, Bernadette of Lourdes, the Cure of Ars, St. Francis of Assisi, and the Saints of the Catacombs, according to the Rev. James Keller, who has just returned from a pilgrimage to the shrines of those saints in Europe.

Father Keller, who made his visit in Lourdes and Rome with the pilgrimage headed by Arch-bishop Richard J. Cushing of Boston, said the particular saints were chosen because of their countless efforts to take Christ's love to the multitudes rather than keep it for themselves.

Catholic Film Programs Set For Parishes

Milwaukee (Special)—Parishes, schools and church organizations may now rent well varied, professional movie programs for showing under Catholic auspices, according to the Catholic Dramatic Movement, a non-profit cultural agency functioning here.

Each 90 minute program rents for \$23.00 per day and consists of a feature story, an adventure story in serial form and an animated cartoon. The Rev. M. Helten, national CDM president announced in inaugurating the new entertainment project.

Detailed information in a folder describing the programs of feature films available for immediate rental may be obtained from the Catholic Dramatic Movement, PO Box 1336, Milwaukee 1, Wis.

In choosing films for specifically Catholic entertainment, Father Helten said, the CDM directors have sought "new productions never shown commercially" and films which are "clean and interesting without being too religious or preachy."

Franciscan Play Marks 2nd Year

Chicago—(NC)—"The Hour of St. Francis" translated program sponsored by the Third Order of St. Francis and now carried on 135 stations throughout the country is completing its second successful year.

Rochester Station WSAJ (1370 kc) carried the program at 6:30 p. m. each Sunday evening. The theme is always a human interest story played by professional radio actors which exemplifies a Christian virtue taught by St. Francis and used in everyday living.

Actors appearing on the program say the following prayer composed by the Rev. Hugh Noonan O.F.M. before taking their parts in dramatizations.

"O Divine Master who has taught us in the great Drama of the Life and Death the eternal purpose of living grant us so to play our part in this earthly stage that we may never in deed wound or cause shame our calling but may fashion out of tears and laughter a deeper truth for light and a brighter hope of Heaven. Who lives and reigns with God, World without end. Amen"

A new daily schedule brings the quarter-hour program of prayer, sacred music and a 6-minute sermon from WRNY on Sundays at 8:45 a. m. and Mondays through Fridays at 12:15 p. m.

Among its 500 outlets, located in several countries, the Sacred Heart program has twenty-five Veterans Administration hospitals, who rebroadcast the program from their own local radio rooms, and eleven federal and state penitentiaries.

Schedule of talks for the week follows: Sunday—Catholic Action; Monday—Constantine; Tuesday—Good King Alfred; Wednesday—Louis Sainted Monarch; Thursday—We Adore Thee O Christ; Friday—The Heart of Jesus.
