



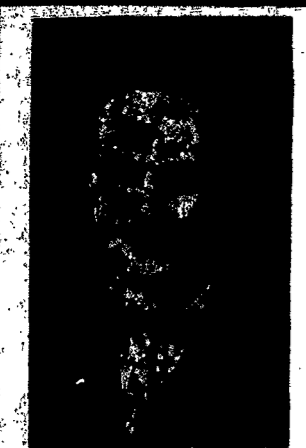
CUA GROUP SETS REUNION

Washington — (NC) — The Alumni Association of the Catholic University of America will hold its first reunion on the university campus from October 22 to 24. It has been announced by Andrew P. Maloney, association president. For the last 10 years the association has been holding its annual meetings in New York, but this year the university officials invited former students to return to the school to witness the institution's expansion in recent years.

Archbishop Patrick A. O'Boyle of Washington, chancellor of the university, will be guest of honor at the traditional banquet on October 23 in the Statler Hotel. During the afternoon, the alumni will be guests at a football game between Catholic University and Johns Hopkins University.

The reunion will close with a Memorial Mass offered by Msgr. Patrick J. McCormick, university rector, in the chapel of McMahon Hall, for the deceased members of the association, on October 24. Richard W. Galher, Washington attorney, has been named general chairman of the arrangements committee.

'Separation of God and State' Deplored By Father Schultz at Annual Red Mass

America has reached a day when, in the name of "progress," its Supreme Court "misinterprets and misrepresents" the theory of separation of Church and State to mean "separation of God and State," the Rev. John G. Schultz, C.S.S.L., of the Catholic University of America, asserted at the Rochester Lawyers' Red Mass on Tuesday in St. Joseph's Church.

"You men of a noble profession," Father Schultz told the approximately 100 attorneys, "must do all you can to influence a return to our national motto, 'In God We Trust' to bring it back into our government, our schools, our homes. Then God will again bless America as America again blesses God."

THE RT. REV. Msgr. William M. Hart, P. A., V. G., representing His Excellency Bishop Kearney, celebrated a Pontifical Mass, assisted by the Rev. Dr. John E. Maney. It was a votive Mass of the Holy Ghost, with red vest-

ments — following a tradition of seeking the inspiration of the Holy Ghost for judges, lawyers and legislators and begging God's blessing on the courts of justice.

In his sermon Father Schultz pointed out that natural law and civil law stem from Eternal Law — God Himself — the law of laws. "No one can stray from the worship of God," he contended, "without first having rejected the natural law."

"That is why it is alarming," he continued, "to reflect that 70 million Americans have rejected the worship of God. They are modern America's 'Lost Legion' — 70 million professing no religion whatsoever. They have strayed from the way, the truth and the life, the Eternal Law."

At the very same time as "so-called intellectuals" of the 18th century were "claiming to be progressive" by supplanting dependence on God with reliance on purely human reason, the founders of the United States, "the real intellectuals" were building a religious nation the speaker said.

"THE DECLARATION of Independence for Russian Crusade Set by HNS

New York — (NC) — Beginning in October and continuing through next May the national headquarters of the Holy Name Society is sponsoring a nationwide movement called "Rosaries for Russia." It has been announced here.

In a note to the Holy Name spiritual directors of the country, the Very Rev. Harry C. Graham, O.P., national director of the Holy Name Society, said: "We feel that the present concern of Catholics over the menace of communism, together with their interest in Our Lady of Fatima insures a warm response among the laity for Rosaries for Russia."

dependence from England was a Declaration of Dependence on the Eternal and Natural Law," he declared. "There was no separation of God and State in its words."

Today's "free thinkers, who are lawless thinkers, are seeking," he maintained, "to establish new laws, all without faith. Thus have 70 million Americans strayed from the principles of Bethlehem and Nazareth to those of Holywood and Reno."

It is a sad day for America, he continued, when "eight men in our Supreme Court have seemed to declare it an American for children in public schools to read of God in the Declaration of Independence or to sing the fourth stanza of our national anthem."

Monsignor Hart was escorted in a procession to the altar by a group of attorneys headed by Supreme Court Justice William F. Love of the Appellate Division chairman of the arrangements committee, and Mayor Samuel B. Dicker. It was the fourth annual Red Mass for the lawyers.
