**CYA Drive Passes Half-Way
 Mark With Men Taking Lead**

Columbus Youth Association campaigners headed toward the half-way mark in their 2,500 membership campaign as they prepared to make their semi-final report at a dinner meeting to night (Thursday) in the ballroom of the Columbus Civic Center.

At the first report dinner Monday evening, the workers turned in 726 members for 34 percent of their quota.

The campaign which started off last Thursday with a dinner meeting at which Bishop James E. Kearney sounded the keynote is scheduled to close at a Columbus Day dinner in the Civic Center ballroom on Tuesday evening.

The first reports put the Men's Division, chairmanned by William J. McLaughlin, far into the lead with 246 members for 40 percent of quota. The Women's

Division, led by Mrs. Daniel E. Macken, had a percentage of 19 with 180 members reported. The remaining 300 members were turned in by the Special Citizen's Committee headed by W. Raymond Whitley.

The unit led by John T. Nohngie came within 7 percentage points of meeting its quota on the first report by turning in 114 members for 93 percent of quota.

Two of the teams in the Men's Division went over the top on their first report. One, led by Burton Mayfield, reported 52 members for a 234 percentage. Leading the Women's Division was Mrs. Justin J. Flanagan's team with 58 members. Mrs. George A. Thorne was high captain in the Women's Division with 40 members for 72 percent.
