# Catholic Schools Cut Tuition in War Area

Kaifeng—(NC)—After a summer marked by battle, destruction and migration, only six of Kaifeng's 20 private schools will reopen this fall, and two of the six are Catholic. (Kaifeng is capital of the north-central province of Honan.)

At least 10 private schools were destroyed or damaged in the fighting for Kaifeng early in the summer. It is estimated that 5,000 students left the city since June. Many of those who have stayed are destitute, as a result of war havoc, and can no longer pay school tuition.

To meet the emergency needs, Catholic schools have cut their tuition fees to the minimum and are taking many pupils without any charge.
