Columbus Day Speaker Urges Catholic To Lead Fight To Preserve Freedoms

"Those who seek to divide forefathers' fought" on America warned that just as our forefathers fought to preserve freedom, "we too will fight now to prevent those who seek to divide us, insidiously or otherwise, from making us satellites of any foreign ideology."
 This warning came from Kings County Surrogate Francis D. McGarey of Brooklyn in an address at Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus banquet closing Columbus Day observance in which he called for more Catholic leaders in all walks of life.
 A Solemn Pontifical Mass with His Excellency, Bishop Kearney as celebrant in St. Joseph's Church opened the day's observance.
 It is a fine thing, Bishop Kearney said in his sermon, for mankind to stop from time to time to ponder on the majestic and heroic lives of great men, who by their ideals stand out and who by their sacrifices made those ideals prevail in the world.
 CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS, the Bishop recalled rode to safety and success on the Santa Maria. It is only in the power of "Holy Mary," he said, that we or any generation can hope to preserve for posterity the graces and blessings of Christianity and all it represents. Current challenges to the Church can be successfully met by following Columbus on the "Santa Maria."

 Rev. Joseph Natale, Director, will continue his series of talks explaining the Divine Office and the Psalms. At the last meeting, in September, Father Natale reminded the Tertiaries that St. Dominic called his Third Order, the Order of Penitence. Through their daily recitation of the Office and other sacrifices, Tertiaries link their acts of penance with the great sacrifice of Christ which is renewed daily at Mass.
 During this past month Third Order Dominicans have become acquainted with the technique of assisting dying non-Catholics. Each month they will be instructed in a different practical work of mercy.
 A feast of special Dominican significance is observed Nov. 5, in honor of Blessed Martin de Porres. He was a 17th century Negro lad of Lima, Peru, despised by his mother and rejected by his white father. Blessed Martin's childhood was spent in arid poverty and racial discrimination, but he filled it with a marvelous charity to the poor and with intense prayer. When 31, he became a Dominican lay brother, spending his life in service for every rank and social level in Lima. In our days of racial hatred the Church has elevated this Negro to the honors next to actual canonization and demands that all of us, regardless of our race or rank, should honor a man for what really counts, the grace of God he has in his soul.
