Similar forums for Holy Name officers in other Deaneries are slated Oct. 29 in Corning and Nov. 5 in Geneva.

Fr. Hilbert Tells Seminarians of China Mission

Prayers to prevent the spread of Communism in China were appealed for by the Rev. Charles P. Hilbert, M.M., an alumnus of St. Bernard's Seminary in the annual Mission Day address at the Seminary, Oct. 6.

The Mission Day, an institution of long standing at the Seminary is conducted under the auspices of the Catholic Students Mission Crusade Unit.

Father Hilbert a missionary of 22 years in the mission field, told of his activities in southern China. His description of Chinese customs and life gave a background for his plea for prayers.

The day's activities planned as a source of spiritual and material aid for the mission fields of the world opened with High Mass in the Seminary Chapel offered by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward J. Byrne, Moderator of the CSMC Seminary Unit.

THE TALK BY Father Hilbert was followed by a parade led by the Seminary band in the sports field north of the Seminary where gaily decorated booths furnished a carnival air. Many visitors joined throughout the day in the festivities and contributed to the cause.

Highlights were a student alumni softball game an auction an open air entertainment of singing and specialty acts and the awarding of prizes donated by local merchants national publishing houses and church supply firms.

During the day members of the Mission Unit kept a constant vigil before the Blessed Sacrament in the Seminary Chapel emphasizing the primary purpose of the day.

Activities were officially ended late in the afternoon by Benediction and devotion in honor of Mary, Queen of the Missions.

body voluntarily rushes to his aid. Everything will be done as quickly as possible to make him comfortable and ready for the doctor's examination. Speed and accuracy are essential. You realize that if he doesn't receive the best possible attention he might not recover and so everyone works together, automatically, unselfishly devoting their attitudes to his welfare.

There are so many ways in which a nurse can be helpful, not only in assisting the doctor, but also in comforting the patient, and his relatives and friends. No matter how slight the injury, emergencies are always accompanied by fear and

anxiety and are a strain on everyone, especially the relatives who feel their helplessness in their grief.

WHETHER AN automobile accident or a pin prick, the nurse must remember the patient has come to the hospital seeking her aid and be as calm, courteous and concerned as the situation requires. They are entrusting something precious to you in placing either themselves or their beloved in your care.

A nurse realizes that the first thing, I believe, and even though she may be actually "afraid" for her patient, she can not allow her feelings to overcome her. The (Continued on Page 8)

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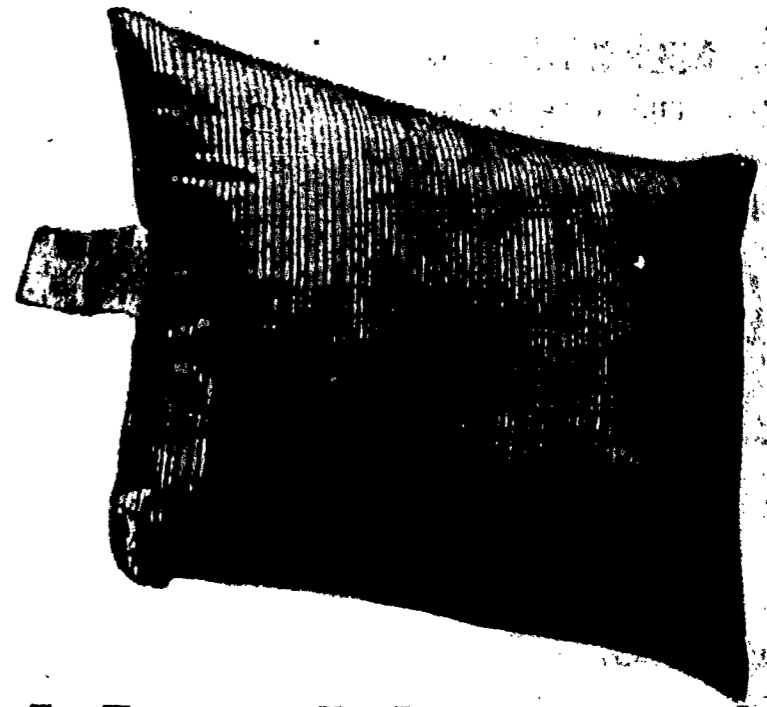
