

Young Thieves On Rise In Berlin, City Woman Told

Thefts of food, clothing and other articles by youths in Berlin, Germany, have increased 12-fold over normal times, it was reported in information received recently by Mrs. Emma Kuhn, 255 Avenue A, a member of St. Michael's parish, Rochester.

Necessity for continued American relief, both public and private, is highlighted in a report compiled by the Social Office of the League of German Catholic Youth, Mrs. Kuhn declared. The report states:

"In normal times Berlin counted 3,000 cases of youth-criminality a year; today (Jan. 1948) we have 3,000 cases a month with rising tendency. If one tries to find the reason for this criminality, he sees that 60-70 per cent are so-called 'poverty trespassers'—these are thefts of necessary needed things like food, clothing, bicycles, shoes."

STATISTICS FROM Essen, a city in the Ruhr River district, reveal youth-criminality is 35-fold more than before the war, the report adds. It divides German youth thus:

(1) Those who possess all they need in money, food and clothing; those who have "friends in America"; those who, having something, deal in the Black Market; (2) those who live, suffer, endure, help others, work and hope; (3) those without fam-

ily or home, without friends, with illnesses. (4) those who have lost their belief in God, in the good will of their fellow-men and in the coming of better times—those who seek illegally to live or who "sit and wait" and "indeed no more know what they are waiting for."

Sister Fidelia who taught at Holy Rosary School, Rochester, for many years, died Monday, Oct. 18, 1948 at St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira.

A native of Rochester, Sister entered the order in 1916. After her novitiate, she was assigned to Holy Rosary School and taught there until the close of the last school year.

Sister Fidelia leaves her mother, Mrs. Margaret Kauch; three brothers, Albert, John and Joseph Kauch; and four sisters, Miss Cecelia Kauch, Mrs. Herbert Bloomer, Mrs. Arthur Tremmer and Mrs. Earl Oswald, all of Rochester. Burial was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.
