It was pointed out that through the years, the Guild furnished all the linens used in Mercy Hospital and that in normal times or before the scarcity of nurses, the organization also provided special nurses for patients who were unable to pay for nursing services.

THE ORGANIZATION also procured much of the equipment that enabled Mercy Hospital to attain and maintain its present high rating among the hospitals of the state and country. Sewing groups were formed by the Guild and these met weekly at the hospital to provide new linens and mending work.
