**Priest Formerly
In Diocese Dies**

A Requiem Mass for repose of the soul of the Rev. Timothy J. McGrath, who served for a time in 1931 as assistant pastor of St. Andrew's Church, Rochester will be celebrated in that church at 9 a. m. Saturday.

Word of the death of Father McGrath in Cold Spring on Monday was received by a relative in Rochester. He was a member of the Diocese of Charleston, South Carolina. He had been in poor health for some time.

Father McGrath also served for a time in 1932 as assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church, Auburn. During World War II he was auxiliary chaplain at Shaw Air Field, S. C. Burial was in Charleston.

He is survived by a brother, Christopher, of Rochester, his mother and sister in Ireland; a brother in Cold Spring, and another brother who is a priest in Australia.

He replaces the Rev. James Broderick, S.J., who is reported ill in a Milwaukee hospital and unable to appear in Rochester at this time.

Veteran of two World Wars, Oxford graduate, writer, lawyer, specialist on foreign affairs, British coalheaver and Maine lumberjack—these are some of the accomplishments of this youngest son of the Eighth Duke of Argyll.

Charles Campbell Emmott also is the newest British intellectual and aristocrat to convert to Roman Catholicism. He was received into the Church on Sept. 14.
