Congress Revue To Bring Out Youth Talent

Fervent activity marks the planning committees for the entertainment program highlighted in the Diocesan Congress of Mary. Scheduled for the evening of Nov. 11 at the Columbus Civic Center, Queensrains Revue will spotlight talent from seven diocesan high schools and the Parish Union Sodality, including a cast of 150 boys and girls.
 Reports from the entertainment steering committee under the chairmanship of Rev. E. Charles Bauer of Holy Family Parish indicate that enthusiasm among the participants is keen. Planned on a competitive basis, the revue promises to be a major attraction for out-of-town delegates to the Congress who will be the guests for two nights in the Homes of Rochester Sodalists.

INCLUDED in the program are both dramatic and musical sketches. Aquinas Institute Band led by Mr. Ray Hasenauer, will furnish an overture and finale for the evening's entertainment. Between each number they will also provide musical interludes. Holy Family High in Auburn has prepared a musical skit entitled "An Evening at Home." A Maroon and White Minstrelletto planned by students of Aquinas Institute promises to be a real challenge to other competitors.

Students of St. Agnes High and Nazareth Academy will render a musical program featuring choral and voice culture groups. A vocal duet will interlude the dramatic sketch planned by Our Lady of Mercy High School, while music for the Parish Union's presentation will take the form of a choral dance, "Waltz of the Flowers."
