At the 11 o'clock Mass Sunday at SS. Peter and Paul's Church, Rochester, where Prof. Bonn's son John Paul Bonn, is organist, all the part music will be from the compositions of late Prof. Bonn.

In addition to his work at the Cathedral, Prof. Bonn taught music at St. Bernard's Seminary in its early days and for nearly 35 years in St. Andrew's Seminary.

For offertory the choir will sing the first of a number of "Ave Marias" written by Prof. Bonn.
