Vatican City (NC) — Stressing the Eucharist as the "source and summit" of the Christian life, Pope Pius XII emphasized the importance of the Holy Eucharist to man's social life in a radio address Sunday to the national Brazilian Eucharistic Congress.

To the vast audience of over 100 million, the Holy Father stated: "The Eucharist is the source of all Christian life, the source of all grace, the source of all strength, the source of all consolation, the source of all union with God and with our brethren."

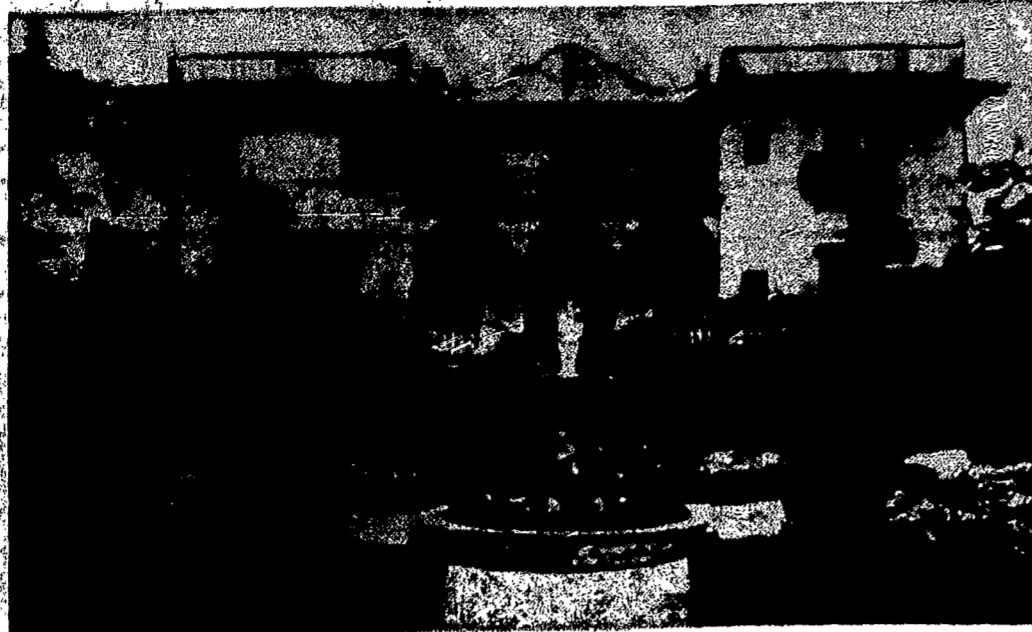

Wanchow, Szechwan Province, China — "Hundreds of thousands of Chinese are blinded by trachoma, and the sight of millions is impaired by it, although the disease could easily be treated if enough simple rural clinics existed," Sister St. Luke of the Theatine Sisters relates.

For four years Sister St. Luke has supervised 200,000 eye treatments in five North China provinces.

Proper treatment requires neither many instruments nor costly medicines, but calls for trained personnel and strict hygiene.

The poor suffer most from it. Obligated to work in good health and back, they defer treatment too long even when it is free, and discontinue it too soon. They cannot afford to go to the cities

Priest-Short Britain Worried By Irish Move

London (NC) — Britain still remains dependent on clergy from Ireland and the suggested decision of the Eireann Government to repeal the existing External Relations Act, cutting all ties with this country, would from the religious point of view be disastrous, the Universe, British Catholic newspaper, commented this week.

"There is only one diocese in the entire country with enough native-born priests to serve the Catholic population," it pointed out.

THE UNIVERSE editorial explained: "The decision of the Eireann Government to repeal the External Relations Act and its probable repercussions both on Eire and the British Commonwealth are political matters on which we express no opinion."

"Although the legal effects of the proposed change will not be so sweeping as some of the newspapers have suggested, it must, nevertheless, be admitted that the change will cause grave inconvenience not limited to the citizens of Eire."

"NO SENSIBLE person will wish to deny the immense debt which Catholicism in England owes to Irish priests. The Irish population in this country is sufficiently large to make it reasonable that there should be a considerable number of them laboring in our midst."

"These are matters of particular interest to the Catholic community."

Catholic Paper Raps Court On Negro Decision

Louisville (NC) — A Federal court ruling that the segregation of Negroes in dining-cars is legal because eight per cent of dining car seats are allotted to Negroes, who make up only four per cent of the patronage, was criticized by The Record, Louisville diocesan weekly, as "unrealistic" because it ignores the inherent dignity of the human personality.

"WE AREN'T tempted for a moment to doubt the judges' knowledge of the existing laws relevant to this case, nor the accuracy of the mathematics involved," the paper commented.

"We think the danger is, however, that many people may assume that justice and equity have been completely satisfied, and the whole problem has been neatly disposed of, just because there is no reasonable objection against the legalistic and mathematical factors in the case," the Record continued.

EVEN IF a Negro is given satisfactory dining-car service in his segregated section, the paper pointed out, "his human dignity has been outraged. He has been treated as something less than a man, not to add, as something less than a free citizen of a democracy. Something other than his rational nature has been made the basis of the rights which are accorded him."

"There is your segregation problem reduced to its simplest terms," the Record concluded. "Let's have the courage and the decency to face it. Let's not indulge ourselves in the illusion that it can be solved in merely legalistic and mathematical terms."

Cardinal Stritch Cautions On Czech Religious Liberty

Chicago (RNS) — Samuel Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, warned the convention of the National Alliance of Czech Catholics here against propaganda being spread in this country about religious freedom in Communist-dominated Czechoslovakia.

"Attempts are being made to show the friendliness of these seizing powers toward religion and their utter willingness to maintain freedom," he said. "These propagandists are very clever in the use of words and in the presentation of certain facts and suppression of other facts."
