Aquinas Speaker Upholds Unity of British Empire

A grim warning that further dissolution of the British empire will be dangerous to the liberty and welfare of all the world was made by a former member of Parliament, Charles Campbell Emmott, in the fourth of the Christian Culture Lectures delivered at Aquinas Institute last Sunday evening.
"Destroy the unity of the British empire," Mr. Emmott declared, "and you wipe out the British genius, justice, stability, industry and other precious values. It is necessary for all men to defend these qualities so vital to the happiness and welfare of mankind."
FOR FOURTEEN years a member of the British government, the tall, grey-haired Englishman, who is related to several families of British royalty, is an eminent British political authority.

A convert to the Catholic Church within the last six weeks, Mr. Emmott in answering questions after his lecture said that he began to study moral and doctrinal arguments of the Church when he realized during the war that "the Catholic Church and Catholic publications in England presented the only firm moral and spiritual viewpoint on current problems."
"I'm impressed so very much," he added, "that this was the only Church which maintained a clear, unflinching and timeless stand against Communism." His convention, he declared, followed a full study of the events of the Reformation and "the completely convincing evidence of religious argument contained in the works of Cardinal Newman."
EMMOTT pointed out that the British empire shared a common quality of "practical genius for government" with the Roman empire, and that desire for security and trade had led Britain into imperialism.
"Britain was not Machiavellian nor predatory in her colonial expansion," he claimed. "She was interested only in freedom for herself and her colonies. She never deliberately menaced another nation, but just by insisting the empire has kept all other power in Europe within bounds for the welfare of all."
He charged that America must shoulder the responsibility to defend civilization as "the British imperial government loses its liberty without thinking of maintaining colonial unity. Our countries must fight together against a nation more dangerous and subtle than Nazi Germany. Russia wants to conquer men's minds as well as men's bodies and lands."

Knights Hear UN Diplomats Chided for Ignoring God

Recent failure of world diplomats to recognize God in the United Nations Bill of Human Rights was deplored by the Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, editor, Catholic-Courier Journal, Sunday, as "an act of infamy," which may doom the United Nations as an organization for establishing world peace.
Father Flynn was guest speaker at a Communion Breakfast of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John in the Knights and Ladies of St. John Club, 365 Adams St. Approximately 200 knights attended this first breakfast to follow their annual Corporate Communion in honor of Christ the King.
"The attempt of statesmen to achieve lasting peace without regard for God is as impossible as trying to build a house in the air without any foundation," he said. "In this day, Father Flynn continued, "when governments insult God and suppress His name from their documents, the doctrine of Christ's universal Kingship over all men becomes most important."
"CHRIST IS OUR King because He is our God. He is our King because He purchased eternal salvation for us by shedding His Blood on a cross. He is the King of all men, not only those who believe in Him but also of all those who reject." Father Flynn explained.
"In the face, therefore, of the world's rejection of Christ," he urged, "Catholics must proclaim more loudly His kingly dignity and His authority over the affairs of men."
Toastmaster at the breakfast was Brigadier General Frederick E. Wegman who presented Colonel Joseph A. Wendelgrass and other speakers.
Heard also were the Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Gefell, regimental chaplain who complimented the knights on the turnout and Brigadier General Leo G. Hosenfeld, supreme counsel who spoke on advantages of the knights' and ladies' new home.
More than 300 knights assisted at Mass in St. Joseph's Church, prior to the breakfast and received Holy Communion in a body. Celebrant of the Mass was a Redemptorist Father, the Rev. James J. Trageser, C.S.S.R.

Canada's Governor General Visits St. Anne's Shrine

Ste. Anne De Beaupre, Que. (NC) — Viscount Alexander of Tunis, Governor General of Canada, paid a visit to the shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre during his recent sojourn at his residence in Quebec City.
On his arrival at the shrine, the Governor General and his party were received by the Rev. Eugene Lefebvre, C.S.S.R., director of pilgrimages, and other Redemptorist Fathers, who direct the shrine. The bells of the carillon pealed a welcome, and on his entry into the Basilica the organ played the National Anthem, God Save the King.
LORD ALEXANDER and his companions evinced great interest in this historic shrine. At the miraculous statue of Ste. Anne, the Governor General saw many doctor and Mrs. Marjorie Goliber as the nurse.
The painting of Ste. Anne which the Marquis of Tracy, Viceroy of Canada, had painted by the famous French artist, Lebrun, and gave to the shrine in 1661.
LORD ALEXANDER was escorted through the main Basilica and also visited the old church, relic of the year 1662, where he saw two paintings by Brother Luc, a Franciscan, dating back to 1670. He was shown the church of the holy stairway, with its 28 steps which thousands of pilgrims have climbed on their knees, and the Stations of the Cross on the mountainside.
Before leaving, the distinguished visitor signed the golden book in which are inscribed the names of many of the world leaders. He told the priests that in his next letter to the King of his visit to this shrine, which he described as "the Lourdes of this continent."
