Parishioners' homes have been saved, sickness periods weathered financially and cooperative buying accomplished at a saving through the Holy Family Parish Credit Union operating in Holy Family auditorium basement on Jay Street, Rochester, according to the group's officers.

The credit union, organized in Holy Family parish in 1937, has become (over an 11-year period) the largest parish credit union in New York State and has handled 2885 loans for \$1,150,000 without a single loss, officers of the union stated this week.

The credit union, organized by the Catholic Central Union, Rochester Branch, with the willing cooperation of the Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Geffel, former pastor of Holy Family Church, came into existence to encourage thrift and to provide money for small loans at a reasonable rate of interest.

Holy Family's group is one of four in Rochester. Other credit unions are operating in St. Ann, St. Peter and Paul and Our Lady of Perpetual Help parishes.

IN A FINANCIAL statement as of Nov. 1, issued by Charles J. Miller, treasurer, the credit union, now operating under the supervision of the Rev. William W. Heisel, pastor, shows receipts of about \$1,375,000 and disbursements of about \$1,259,000. A reserve has been established of over \$6000 in sound government securities. Earnings have totaled \$4,539.54.

The statement shows \$190,001.42 in shares. Personal loans have totaled \$11,498.52. Interest gained amounted to \$7,539.54.

Success of the Parish Credit Union has been due, Central Union officials state, to the untiring and unselfish work of officers and committees.

Present officers include President William C. Schwab, Vice-president Joseph Leitner, Treasurer Charles C. Miller and Secretary Miss Martha Schuey. Andrew Wuest, chairman, and his credit committee pass on applications of loans.
