**Leinen Heads Hospital Drive Corporation Unit**

Raymond F. Leinen has been appointed chairman of the corporations committee of the \$6,940,000 Rochester hospital building fund movement. It was announced this week by Theodore C. Briggs, President of the Rochester Hospital Fund.

Mr. Leinen is executive vice-president of the Lincoln Rochester Trust Company and has long played an active role in civic affairs.

In announcing Mr. Leinen's appointment, Mr. Briggs said that the committee would present the program of the Fund to corporations and other business organizations in the city and the outlying areas to be served by the six hospitals participating in the Fund's modernization and expansion program.

"The Rochester business community is keenly aware of the special stake it has in the improvement of our voluntary hospital system," said Mr. Briggs. "This is shown by the fact that, although the fund-raising movement is not to be launched formally until later this year and no subscriptions have been actively sought, business and industry here have already come forward with nearly a million dollars in down payments on the full subscriptions they will make at a later date."

IN ACCEPTING the chairmanship, Mr. Leinen said that the building fund program, which includes construction of a new 120-bed hospital in the northside industrial and residential area, offers business concerns "an opportunity to make a worthwhile investment in an essential civic resource."

"Enlightened and interested," he said, "demands creation of adequate hospital facilities for the worker and his dependents not only to reduce the number of days off the job due to illness, but also to avoid the distractions that result from the employee's anxiety over inadequate health protection for his family."

Mr. Leinen added that he was now enlisting a group of business leaders who would serve him on the Fund's corporations committee.

**Air Conditioner Donated To St. Joseph's By Elks**

St. Joseph's Hospital was presented with two modern air conditioners by Elmira Lodge, No. 62, B. P. O. E., last week. One unit has been installed in a room on the women's medical division, and the other on the men's division. Approximate cost of this equipment including installation is \$1000.00.

This piece of equipment is especially designed for the comfort of individuals suffering from asthma and for those who are sensitive to pollen, dust and other particles present in ordinary atmosphere.

THE AIR CONDITIONER is installed in the window, and controls the outside air coming into the room, so as to produce the desired condition in the room. The pollen and dust are automatically filtered out of the air, enabling the person sensitive to these substances to be comfortable, and at the same time to be in a well-ventilated room.

The conditioner is easy to operate, and extensive research has proven it to be 90 per cent efficient in bringing about desired results in the atmosphere.

Mrs. Donald Nichols, in the picture, who suffers from asthma is enthusiastic about the beneficial effects from the conditioner in her room at the hospital. It was installed two days after her admission and she has been made much more comfortable by it.

The hospital officials as well as members of the medical staff are grateful for this valuable equipment designed to improve the care and treatment of patients suffering from these conditions. And the patients, themselves, who will be made more comfortable through the generosity of the Elks, will be truly appreciative.
