Mrs. Snyder said her commendation was not only for widely known charities of the organization at its national and state levels, but especially for the work of the local court.

Continuing, Mrs. Snyder said: "In every project undertaken by the National Council of Catholic Women, Court Auburn has been outstanding for its cooperation. In this manner we are working for a better community; for it has been said many times that anything which helps the individual home is helping the entire city."

After a brief review of the causes underlying the need of overseas relief, the speaker urged her listeners to form sewing groups to prepare clothing for European children. She announced that several of these groups have been organized among the Catholic women of this city.

Unless we help rebuild the shattered homes of Europe, we talk in vain of world stability, she declared.

Mrs. George Frank, grand regent, advised the members to form sewing groups in their homes in order to make warm clothing for the children in need in the war-stricken areas of Europe. Many suggestions were given by the members regarding making and sewing and it was felt that a large shipment would be ready for the boat sailing Nov. 25, which will arrive in time for Christmas.

Mrs. George Cuddy was given a vote of thanks for her work as chairman of the supper. Also Mrs. Annan Mae Ferguson was congratulated on the success of the banquet of which she was in charge. Miss Kathleen Cunningham was the capable auctioneer. The proceeds will be used for war relief projects.
