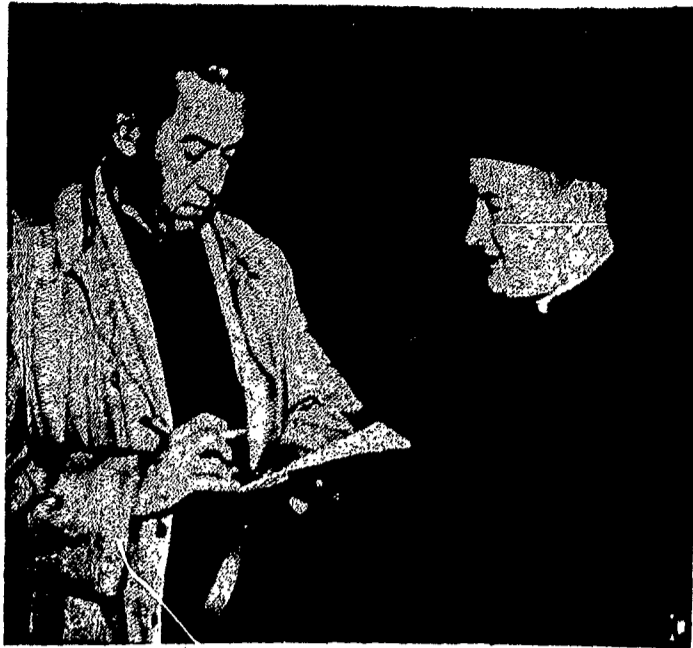

\$35,000 Rebuilt Organ To Be Heard At Holy Family

Completely rebuilt and having a replacement value of \$35,000, the organ in Holy Family Church, Rochester, will be played Sunday night, Dec. 5, for the first time since its improvement.

The organ recital will be given by Charles A. Claus, organist at Holy Family for 38 years. A new console and 33 stops will be used in the program. Various stops of the organ will be illustrated and liturgical compositions will be played. The public is invited.

REMODELING of the organ is in line with other extensive repairs made in Holy Family Church, the Rev. William W. Hesel, pastor, said today. The refurbishing now in process is expected to be finished by Christmas.

The entire Sanctuary has been rebuilt and a new altar with baldichino installed. A new triple-vaulted ceiling will be noted on entering the church, and five new entrances have been added. Redecoration and remodeling has been under the direction of Architectural Artist Herman P. Butler.

The organ was originally built in 1914 by Wangerin-Weichert Company of Milwaukee, Wis. The rebuilding was done by Tellers Organ Co. of Erie, Pa.

Everything inside the organ was taken to Erie and either repaired or rebuilt. The organ's new console is operated by the latest type electro-pneumatic action. There are over 2,100 pipes.

U. S. Priest Named To Vatican Post

Rome - (RNS) - The Rev. William J. Doherty, C.S.C., professor of law in the University of Notre Dame, has been appointed an auditor of the Sacred Roman Rota by Pope Pius XII. It was announced here.

One of the three tribunals of the Roman Curia, the Rota handles contentious cases requiring judicial procedure, and is best known as a court of appeal from diocesan courts in matrimonial cases. The tribunal is made up of ten auditors, or judges, chosen by the Pope from various countries.

Fr. Doherty, who is 50 years old, is a native of Merrill, Wisconsin.

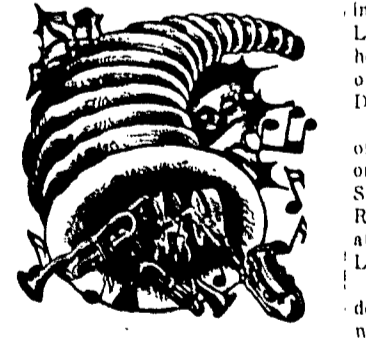
