

St. Monica Church To Mark Golden Jubilee On Dec. 12

A solemn Pontifical Mass on Sunday, Dec. 12 will open the observance of the golden jubilee of St. Monica's Church in Geneva Street.

The Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, will pontificate at the jubilee Mass, the Very Rev. Magr. Gerald C. Lambert, pastor of St. Monica's has announced.

Following the Mass which is scheduled to begin at 11 a.m., there will be a jubilee dinner in the parish hall for the clergy, religious and representatives of the city. Bishop Kearney will be the speaker.

Assistant priest at the jubilee Mass will be the Rt. Rev. Magr. William M. Hart, F.A.V.G. Magr. Lambert will be Deacon and the Very Rev. Magr. James C. McAniff, Chancellor of the diocese will be sub-deacon.

Deacons of Honor will be the Rt. Rev. Magr. Joseph S. Cameron and the Rev. Leo V. Smith. The Rev. John E. Mervy, S.T.D., will be master of ceremonies and the Rev. Mr. Elmer McDonald second master of ceremonies.

Students of St. Bernard's Seminary from St. Monica's Church will fill the minor offices of the Mass. St. Monica's choir, under the direction of Hugh Dodge, will sing.

MONSIGNOR Lambert has extended an invitation to every family in the parish to have at least one representative at the Mass.

Monsignor Lambert will celebrate a solemn High Mass for all deceased members of St. Monica's on Monday, Dec. 13 at 9 a.m. The golden jubilee ceremonies will conclude with a reception in the parish hall Monday evening to be featured by an entertainment. Members of the first 65 families which

formed the original parish, will be guests of honor at the reception.

It was on the feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, 1898 that the Rt. Rev. Magr. John P. Brophy, first pastor of St. Monica's, celebrated the first Mass in the original St. Monica's Church, a two-story brick building facing Geneva Street.

Monsignor Brophy also celebrated the first Mass in the present church on Jan. 30, 1915. The first pastor died on April 18, 1939 and was succeeded by the Rt. Rev. Magr. William F. Bergan, P.A., whose pastorate ended with his death last December. Monsignor Lambert was named third pastor of St. Monica's on last January 22.

Hornell Hospital Drive Tops Goal With \$507,710

Hornell — St. James Mercy Hospital has been assured an additional three stories and a substantial increase in bed capacity by the outstanding success of the United Hospitals Building Fund campaign.

With many more subscriptions still expected, a total of \$507,710 was recorded this week, well over the goal of \$475,000. Drive officials predict a possible \$525,000 final total.

More than 70 per cent of the subscription will go toward expansion of St. James Mercy Hospital. The remainder is allocated to Bethesda Hospital. They are the only two such institutions serving this city and surrounding communities.

Hornell and all area communities surpassed their campaign quotas. Included in the drive coverage were Canisteo, Aikpur, Canaseraga, Alfred and Almond.

St. James Hospital is conducted by the Sisters of Mercy. His Excellency Bishop Kearney heads the board, of which Dr. O. K. Stewart is president. Chairman of the successful campaign was John J. McElinger. Kneiber & Waasdorp, Roch-

ester architects, drew plans for the St. James Mercy addition, which will front on Canisteo Street and will supplement existing hospital buildings.

An estimated fund of more than \$300,000 in federal aid and from other grants will be added to the St. James expansion appropriations.

The Rev. Orestes Canali, a Canon of the Collegiate Church of Monte Carlo, Italy who served many years in Rochester diocese, died Nov. 4, 1948 in the Italian city in the Province of Lucca.

Officiating at the Solemn Mass of Requiem was Monsignor Proposto Micheli in the Monte Carlo Church. Burial was in that church's cemetery.

In the fall of 1906, Father Canali was appointed by Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid to establish the parish of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel and the first Mass of that parish was celebrated in Corpus Christi Hall.

Stationed at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Father Canali, a learned priest, taught at St. Andrew's Seminary for 9 years. He also served as pastor of St. Thomas Aquinas Church, Leicestershire and helped out at St. Felix Church, Clifton Springs.

Protestant Deplores School Religion Lack

Milwaukee, Wis. — (RNS) — Criticism of American Protestant Churches for permitting religion to be excluded from the public schools, was voiced here by Howard Lowry, president of Wausau (O.) College.

Speaking at the fourth national biennial assembly of the United Council of Church Women, Dr. Lowry said "we are asking for a society that has religious values but we blindly believe we can go on excluding from our education the religious element that produces these values."

"This is a silly, tragic form of national self-deception," he declared, "and our Churches must share the blame."

Earthquakes Damage China Orphanages

Chaotung, Yunnan — (NCU) — A series of earthquakes, causing loss of life and heavy damage, has shaken this mountainous region of China's southwest for two weeks.

The cathedral here was badly damaged, while two Catholic orphanage buildings collapsed during a severe shock, which took several lives and destroyed more than 300 houses. Casualties were heavier in outlying villages. The leper home conducted by the Catholic mission escaped, but five lepers were killed when a leprosarium 20 miles from here collapsed.

'No-Priest Land' Aid Asked By Home Missioner

More than 1,000 counties in the United States are without a resident priest, student members of the Mission Society of St. Bernard's Seminary were told last Sunday night.

Speaker was the Very Rev. W. Howard Bishop of Glendale, Wis., founder of the Home Missioners of America, a society which he described as "an organized effort to bring Catholic Truth to countless fellow Americans who know nothing, or nothing but error, about the Catholic Church."

If all the counties without a structure of Catholicism were grouped together, Father Bishop stated, they would form a country the size of Mexico, with a population as great as Canada. "The needs of this 'No-Priest Land,'" he asserted, "constitute a valid mission call."

Explaining how his society sends itinerant missionaries together on the outskirts of "No-Priest Land" "to strengthen the Faith of timid Catholics and plant it in the hearts of non-Catholics." Father Bishop declared that although progress is slow, "the trickle of conversions is ever increasing."

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward J. Byrne, moderator of the Seminary's Mission Society, urged the seminarians to support Father Bishop's mission group by prayers and financial assistance, and to prepare themselves to be home missionaries in the dioceses in which they will labor.

"Breaking down opposition to the Church and ignorance of its doctrine," Monsignor Byrne declared, "is the task to be accomplished by the joint efforts of all American Catholics."

Monsignor Byrne presented to the Rev. Walter Geraghty, last year's student president, the Paulin medal of the Catholic Students Mission Crusade of America in recognition of a successful year of leadership and service.
