have seen apparitions of the Blessed Virgin at a Carmelite convent in Lips., Philippine Islands, is under study by theologians Sisters and the Bistrop of Lips is withholding public comment pending the results of the theologisms investigation.)

Washington-(NC)-"I have just been talking with the Blessed Virgin, the Rev. Patrick Shanley, O.C.D., Vicar Provincial of the Philippine Islands, quotes a young Carmelite, repeated her counsels to her little one: postulant whom he visited at her convent at Lipa in the, Province of Batangas. "It gave me quite a strange feeling," Father Patrick adds.

Father Patrick quotes the postulant in an article written by him and appearing in the November-December issue of the magazine Mount Carmel, published here by the Discalced Carmellte Fathers.

The article tells of a series of visions said to have been received by the postulant. Teresita, during last September and of accompanying showers of the petals of red roses, which "do not grow in this country

FATHER PATRICK'S article starts:

Mary, at about five o'clock in the afternoon, a Sister who was taking a walk in the garden suddenly remarked that a vine shook and, as there was no wind at all, it attracted her attention.

"She approached and heard a woman's gentle voice saying: Fear not, my child. Kiss the ground. Whatever I shall tell you to do, you must do. For 15 consecutive days come to visit me here in this spot. Eat some grass, my child. The Sister did not see arryone

"Next day, Monday, at five o'clock the Sister returned to the place She kneft and recited the Hall Mary. She had osnly reached the words 'full of grace' when she remarked that the vine was moving and, io and believed, she saw a Beautiful Lady with her hands clasped on her breast, a golden rosary hanging on her right hand. She was stooping slightly. Her dress was pure whate, simple, held in at the waist by a narrow cloth belt. Her feet were bare and resting on clouds which were about two feet above the ground. Her face, of inclescribable beauty, was radiant."

obey their superiors and not to forget the things I ask. "I shall not ask bigger things from you, as you expect, because you are my little ones. Do not forget to consecrate your seles to me on October 7 Be very good.

"I am MARY, MEDIATRIX OF ALL GRACE I shall always bless the Community morning and evening." Blessing the Sister,

"On September 30 rose petals were strewn in the cells of the "On Sunday, September 12, the Feast of the Most Holy Name of monastery. On October 3 a shower of flowers fell on the staircase. Occasional showers followed within the cloister On November 11 the petals fell outside and were seen by some visitors"

Father Patrick writes that when he reached the convent during the incidents, crowds of people had gathered outside it After he refired to his room following Mass the next day, a Sister Elizabeth exceptional historical value, datknocked on his door and said: "Father, the petals"

"WHEN I LOOKED out the window," he relates "I saw crowds of people at the other end of the building, with their hands cupped and raised heavenward to catch petals and a photographer with his back to the seventeenth century. Some of the objects were stolen camera raised skyward... altar, which was forced open.

"I SAW THESE THINGS WITH MY OWN EYES, but I did not see the petals until afterwards. They are red and botanists say they do not grow in this country . . . Japanese Nun Lectures At Buddhist Monastery
