Nazareth Normal

St. Joseph Nuns' Teacher School Marks Fiftieth Year

rived from Ireland and they, with fifteen other postulants from the diocese, began their studies in the new Normal School, which had as its director Sister Pauline Egan, a graduate of St. Andre Normal Institute, Bruges, Sister Angelina Hutchinson, a graduate of Buffalo State Normal School, was assistant director and upon the death of Sister Pauline in 1902 she became director.

A program was immediately formulated to meet the requirements for State Teacher Certification, which was the First Grade Certificate, giving the right "to teach any public school in commissioner district." This certificate was renewable at ten year periods.

AT THE TURN of the century, a higher form of certification was set up by the State—the Life State Teacher's Certificate, a credential entitling the holder to teach for life in any public school in the State of New York.

In 1906 Nazareth Normal School was designated as an authorized center for the taking of Life State Certificate Examinations. Previous to that date, the Sisters who qualified under the Life State took the examinations in Buffalo.

Sister Florentine McCarthy became Director of the Normal School in 1905. Her keen mind, broad aims and far vision made her especially valuable in the training of young religious teachers.

She was intellectually ambitious for every individual who was placed under her care, and had a marvelous gift in discovering latent powers and giving a fine incentive and encouragement to their best development. She was ingenious in finding means for equipping the training school and some of the departments are even today a tribute to her tireless labor.

IN 1916 SISTER ANNA de Paul Quigley was appointed Director. She brought to this position an unusual gift for organization and a keen understanding of the problems and trends in modern education. A graduate of the Rochester City Normal as well as of St. Elizabeth College, she was well prepared to foster both the academic and the professional training of the young teacher and to develop a well integrated curriculum.

Very early Sister Anna de Paul began plans for the three year normal course. Her aspirations were fulfilled and a new impetus was given to her efforts when the Nazareth College Charter was granted by the Legislature in 1925 and included the power "to maintain a department for the instruction and preparation of young women in the art of teaching and the right to confer literary, scientific, technical and professional degrees."

Six months after the charter was granted, the new Normal Curriculum was inaugurated. In June 1929 Dr. Ned H. Dearborn, then Director of the Teacher Training Division of the New York State Education Department, gave formal approval of the three-year curriculum in these words:

"This is to notify you that having examined the courses of study, faculty qualifications, admission and graduation requirements, library and practice facilities, and having observed several classes conducted by both regular training school instructors and student teachers, the University gives official approval of the work of the Nazareth Normal School in preparing teachers for elementary schools."

"By this is to be understood that upon graduation the holders of the Nazareth Normal School diploma meet the present standards our requirements for the preparation of elementary teachers."

This curriculum followed the first three-year normal course inaugurated during the same year in the State Normal Schools. It was almost entirely professional in scope. In 1935 the combined liberal-cultural and professional curriculum was introduced, which merged into the 1938 curriculum approved by the Board of Regents as the four-year curriculum for elementary teachers, leading to the degree Bachelor of Education.

The three years of professional education are completed at Nazareth Normal School. The fourth year in the liberal-cultural fields is pursued at Nazareth College.

FOR WIDER recognition of the degree, it was necessary that the curriculum leading to it be approved by the Teacher Education Division and the Division for Higher and Professional Education of the New York State Department.

The program toward such approval was completed in December 1940 and Dr. J. Hillis Miller, Associate Commissioner in charge of Higher and Professional Education addressed the following communication to Sister Anna de Paul in 1942:

"I herewith advise you that on this date the New York State Department of Education has registered the combined four-year curriculum to be offered at Nazareth Normal School."

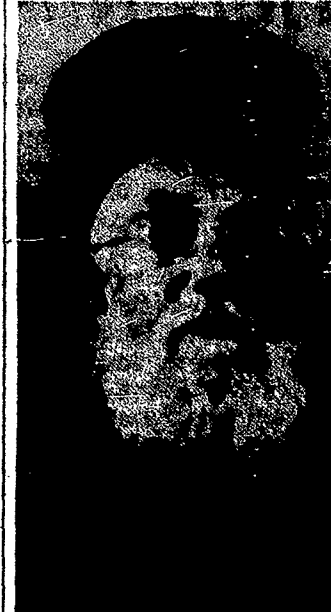
He is Pere Abdeljalil, who had just returned from an eight-month survey in Egypt, Lebanon, Iran and Iraq.

"If I have been of any assistance whatever to you in the great work which you are doing for education in this State, it gives me great pleasure. I am indeed happy to know that your efforts are at last crowned with success."
