

# Holy Name Men Rally For Mass Sunday

Delegations of Holy Name Society men from all parishes throughout Monroe County will mark the feast of the Holy Name at 11 a. m. Sunday, Jan. 2, in Corpus Christi Church, Main St. East, Rochester.

More than 1,000 men are expected to crowd the church for the third annual Pontifical Mass to be offered on the Feast Day by His Excellency Bishop Kearney, and to hear the message of the Very Rev. Harry C. Graham, O.P., of New York City, national director of the Holy Name Society, who will preach the sermon.

Officers of the Mass will include the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, P.A., V.G., assistant priest; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. F. William Stauder and the Rev. Arthur F. Florack, former spiritual directors of the Diocesan Holy Name Union, deacons of honor; the Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, Diocesan Union spiritual director, deacon; the Rev. Thomas F. McVeigh, spiritual director of Corpus Christi Holy Name Society, subdeacon; the Rev. John E. Maney, master of ceremonies, and students of St. Andrew's Seminary in the minor offices.

EDITOR OF THE national "Holy Name Journal," Father Graham, who is coming to Rochester at the invitation of Bishop Kearney, is expected to give the congregation an outline of the program of Catholic action being projected for the Holy Name Society of which he is national head. He has not been in the Rochester Diocese for several years.

This will be the third annual Pontifical Mass in observance of the Holy Name Feast. Large crowds attended the first two, St. Michael's and St. Monica's Churches.

Holy Name executives have urged the officers of parish units to take steps to see that their men are well represented at the Mass. Members of the executive committees of the Diocesan Union and the Deaneary unions are requested to assemble in the church vestibule and to march to the front pews in a body.

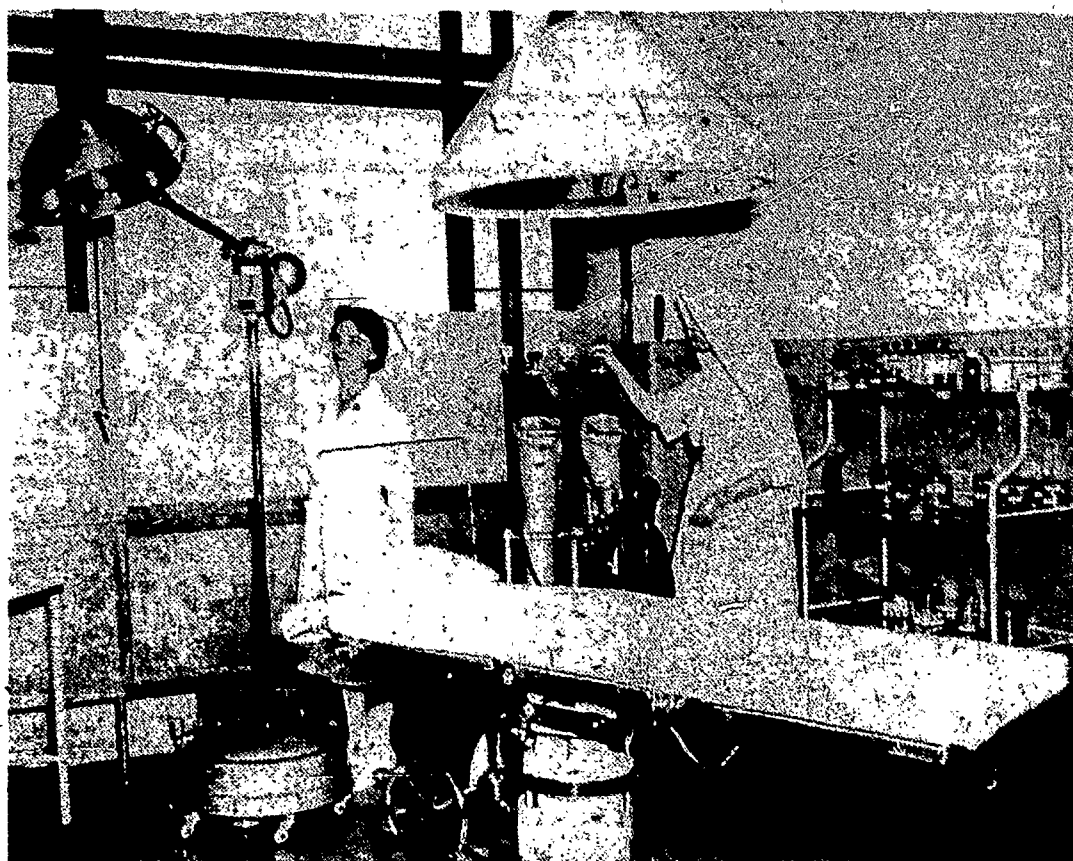

# Oriental Mass To Mark Burning of Mortgage

With His Excellency, Bishop Kearney presiding, a Solemn Oriental Mass according to the Byzantine Rite will be celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Andrew Hallak, pastor, in St. Nicholas Church, Remington at Leo Street, Rochester, Sunday, Jan. 9.

The ceremony will mark the burning of the mortgage on the church, last payment of \$700 having wiped out the indebtedness.

The Mass will begin at 11 a. m. and in attendance also will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, P.A., Vicar General, and the Very Rev. James C. McAniff, Chancellor of Rochester diocese. An Oriental dinner in the church hall will follow immediately after the Mass.

MONSIGNOR HALLAK who has the title Archimandrite in the Byzantine rite came to Rochester, May 1, 1946 to take charge of the Syrian-Melchite parish. The pastor serves under His Excellency, Bishop Kearney at though celebrating Mass and conducting divine services strictly according to the Byzantine Rite.

Monsignor Hallak who came here from Mobile, Alabama is a member of the St. Basil Order of Chouan, St. Lebanon.

The Latin Church and the Greek Catholic Church of which St. Nicholas is a part have the same faith but latter differs from the former in several liturgical points. Monsignor Hallak points out that instead of Latin, the Greek or Arabic language is used at will in the Mass in the Divine services and in all religious ceremonies.

In this country, 40 Melchite churches are under the jurisdiction of the American Bishops and the church properties belong to their respective Roman Catholic dioceses. There is no Melchite Bishop in this country.

He also has served for more than a year as narrator of the Catholic programs presented intermittently on "The Church of the Air" on Sundays over Station WRNY under the sponsorship of the Knights of Columbus Speakers Bureau.
