# Life Behind 'Iron Curtain' Described by First European Here Under New DP Law

"Ask no questions — and keep your thoughts to yourself." That's Rule Number One for life behind the Iron Curtain, according to Ivan Bandura, 50-year-old Ukrainian who is the first DP to be settled in the Rochester area under provisions of the Displaced Persons Law.

Ivan knows whereof he speaks. He spent months during the war in forced labor — first under the Nazis, then under the Russians.

"YOU LOSE all your friends behind the Curtain," Ivan declared. "All is fear, suspicion, mistrust. Whole families disappear overnight. It is horrible."

Ivan's serious voice quavered; his wiped moistened eyes with his handkerchief as he continued. "My sister is over there. I haven't seen her for several years. I write often — but no answer."

What does he think of America? "You have too much here," he replied. "Too much wealth — too much food — too much waste. Only those who have seen the suffering in Europe can know how much you Americans waste."

IVAN SPOKE in his native Ukrainian tongue. His remarks were translated by two new friends in Rochester — the Rev. Jaroslav Gabro, assistant pastor of St. Joseph's Church, and Mrs. Stephanie Keck, of 150 Roycroft Drive, a distant relative who is sponsoring Ivan's settlement here under the DP Act.

He landed in New York on Dec. 24 and came to Mrs. Keck's home on Christmas Day. "Already John has taught me to save food which I ordinarily throw out," she said. He smiled as she called him John — his new American name.

John was brought to the freedom of America after four years in two DP camps in Germany, through the services of the Rochester Diocese's Resettlement Committee, which operates under the leadership of the Very Rev. Magr. Gerald C. Lambert, director of Rochester Catholic Charities. The committee is affiliated with the Bishops Resettlement Committee under the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

TALL, STURDY, alert, John Bandura is a man of many parts. A college graduate, he speaks Ukrainian, Russian, Polish and German. During the war his

forced labor was a continuation of his regular job as superintendent of the railroad which ran through his native city of Pukov, West Galicia.

During his stay in DP camps in Berchtesgaden and Kardsfeld he worked for the camp administration as a bookkeeper. He carries proficiency certificates, issued by the International Relief Organization, in both bookkeeping and farming. He will be employed in farm work in the Rochester area.

When he learns the English language, however, he hopes possibly to obtain employment at

bookkeeping because while not disliking farm work, he likes city life and people.

WHILE IN the DP camp he was engaged in another of his accomplishments — singing. He was part of a stage group which entertained the DPs. He is looking forward to joining St. Joseph's Church choir.

Unmarried, John has a niece in one of the DP camps who has three children. Her husband, who has relatives in America, is hoping to bring the family to this country.

He has no love for the Russian authorities and their spy system. People who minded their own business under Nazi occupation were unharmed, he said, but the Russians confiscated money, property or personal possessions indiscriminately.

"There was one thing they couldn't take," he said. "That was our religion."

John is a Ukrainian Catholic of the Byzantine Rite. He already has made many acquaintances in his new parish. "This is a great country," he concluded.
