

## Deanery HNS Units To Hear Educator

One of the nation's top education experts will outline the Catholic position on "Federal Aid to Education" at the regular winter meeting of the Rochester Deanery (Monroe County) Holy Name Union at 3 p. m. Sunday, Jan. 30, in St. Monica's School Hall, Genesee Street.

Speaker will be the Rev. William E. McManus, Ph.D., assistant director of the Education Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, Washington.

From all Monroe County parishes have been urged to attend the meeting, which will open with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in the church.

**FOLLOWING BENEDICTION**, the men will assemble in the school hall, where the Very Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, pastor, will extend welcome. All the men are requested to register their name, address and parish on entering the hall.

Among guests to be introduced at the session will be the Rev. John B. Affleck, O.P., of New York City, an assistant national director of the Holy Name Society.

The Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, spiritual director of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union,

will present Father McManus, who has written extensively on the subject of government aid to non-public schools.

**CURRENT IMPORTANCE** of the topic was stressed by Edward M. Lorscheider, Rochester Deanery Union president, who will preside. He recalled the recent request of the Rev. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent of Catholic schools in the Rochester Diocese, that all lay organizations study and prepare to defend the Catholic position on the question of federal aid, now before Congress.

Urging that all parish Holy Name Societies be represented at the meeting, Lorscheider asked that secretaries of each Society telephone all members of their executive boards, as well as Deaneary delegates and arrange to pool transportation to St. Monica's.

**ARTHUR P. FARREN**, Diocesan Union executive secretary, has arranged to have a display of all Holy Name supplies on hand, which delegates may order for their societies.

Lorscheider noted that the business of the meeting will be run on a close schedule, to assure adjournment at 5 p. m. It is expected that Father McManus will answer questions about education legislation if time will allow.

## 'Si' Fennell Aids White Russians Out of Shanghai

Moving of 400 White Russians from Shanghai to the Philippines has been accelerated by James F. Fennell, of Rochester, according to the Rev. Patrick O'Connor, N.C.W.C. News correspondent writing from Shanghai, China.

Sailing with the first contingent of White Russians bound for Gulan in Saranar, P.I. was the Rev. Andrew Oucousow, Moscow-born Russian Jesuit. Their destination is a former U. S. Navy base to be used as a temporary refuge camp for non-Soviet Russians fleeing from communist-threatened China.

**MOVEMENT OFFICERS** for the Russians is Fennell, known here as "Si," who is administrative assistant of the Catholic Welfare Committee and whose services have been loaned on request to the International Refugee Organization for the emergency evacuation.

Father Oucousow has been teaching in St. Michael's College for Russian boys in Shanghai. Most of St. Michael's students are leaving Shanghai with their parents. Many of the Russian girls studying in Sancta Sophia School, conducted by Sisters of St. Columban, are likewise lined up for departure with their families.

The IRO is evacuating the White Russians and other refugees, including Jews bound for Palestine, from Shanghai.

## Bishop to Dedicate St. Anne's School

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney will dedicate the second parish school serving the Brighton area when he blesses St. Anne's School, Sunday, Jan. 30 at 4 p. m.

Participating will be pastors of neighboring parishes, lay leaders in the parish and parents and other parishioners.

The new \$250,000 school building completed at Brighton Park and East Henrietta Road is scheduled to open for a new semester on Feb. 1, according to the Rev. George J. Schmitt, pastor.

St. Anne's parish came into existence in the summer of 1929 when it was found that there were 170 Catholic families living in that vicinity and steps were taken to organize a church.

**THE FIRST MEETING** was held in the old 49 school, Tuesday, Dec. 3 and organization was perfected. The Rev. George J. Schmitt was the first and has been the only pastor.

The church was dedicated by Bishop John Francis O'Brien on Feb. 9, 1930. Construction of a priests' house was completed on Dec. 1, 1931 and the parish hall was built in the spring of 1934. Rapid growth of the parish pointed the need for a school. Ground was broken for the new building on Oct. 30, 1947. More than 220 pupils are expected to enroll the first day in the building having eight classrooms and a kindergarten as well as health room and principal's office.

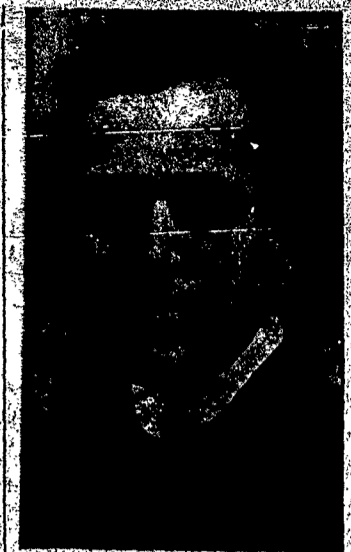
The architect is Frank M. Quinn and construction was handled by Frank G. Maggio and Brothers, Inc.
