4th Degree K.C. Masters Support Card. Mindszenty

Masters of the Fourth Degree, Calvert Province in a two-day meeting at Piccadilly Hotel, New York City acted on the arrest of Cardinal Mindszenty and evils of Euthanasia.

Taking part in the session was Basil J. Vaillancourt of Elmira, master of the 5th New York District comprising the area of Rochester diocese.

The Fourth Degree leaders deplored the arrest of the Hungarian Cardinal and sent copies of the resolution to President Truman and representatives in Congress. They condemned Euthanasia or "mercy-killing," and sent copies of the resolution to Governor Dewey, majority and minority leaders and various representatives in New York State legislature.
