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## Father Peyton, Famed Rosary Priest, Greeted by Clergy, Laity in Auburn

Auburn — The Rev. Patrick Peyton, C.S.C., founder of the Family Rosary Crusade and the Family Theater Program heard weekly over the Mutual Broadcasting System was warmly welcomed here last week.

Upon his arrival in Auburn with John Timothy Smith, a prominent attorney from Syracuse and a classmate of Mayor Edward T. Boyle, Father Peyton addressed the Nuns of the city at Holy Family Auditorium. He was introduced by Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Conway, pastor of Holy Family Church.

Father Peyton then appeared at Station WMBO where he made a recording for the Knights of Columbus weekly Sunday broadcast of Catholic News and Views. The broadcast was presented last Sunday afternoon.

A DINNER in honor of the famous priest, whose program featuring outstanding stars of screen, stage and radio, is heard over 432 stations, was held at the Osborne Hotel by a group of his friends and supporters. There were 26 laymen present and six clergymen, including Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Conway, V.F. Rt. Rev. Msgr. William E. Conway, Rev. John B. Crowley, Rev. John B. Crowley, Rev. Alfred H. Hottel, Rev. John P. Norris and Rev. Albinus Lesch, C. P.

Father Peyton described in detail his early family life in Ireland and his struggles in America, especially after his ordination with the launching of the Family Theater movement. At the conclusion of the talk, Father Peyton was presented with a substantial purse to help him carry on his work.

The busy priest concluded his stay in Auburn by paying a visit to the Knights of Columbus home and addressing a large gathering of members who were marking "Old Timers' Night."

To popularize family prayer through the slogan "The family that prays together, stays together," Father Peyton explained briefly the purpose of the Family Theater. He thanked all for their fine attention and support and stated that his short stay in Auburn was fruitful both spiritually and financially.

## Waterloo Church Interior Extensively Transformed

Waterloo — St. Mary's Church at Waterloo, has practically completed a program of extensive repairs and alterations under the supervision of Rev. George T. McCall, Pastor.

Sometime ago a campaign was carried on by the members of the parish to raise money to do the work and the cost has run close to \$20,000.

This is the first time since the church was erected in 1888 that any large amount of work has been done on it. The side altars have been moved outside the altar, to the place where the confessionals formerly stood. The confessionals have been placed in the rear of the Church. The large crucifix which stood over the high altar has been raised above the sanctuary in the dome.

An entirely new system of wiring throughout the building has been completed and all fixtures are new.

R. Attinasi and Sons of Rochester have handled the decorations. Paul Cooper, Rochester, is the contractor. Franklin Lamphear installed the wiring and William Van Riper did the mason work.

ST. MARY'S PARISH dates back to 1848 when Rev. Thomas O'Flaherty founded the first parish. At that time a small Church was erected to the south of the present structure and after erection of the new church, the building was used for the first Catholic school. Later it was used as a hall and when the building had outworn its usefulness, was torn down. The present St. Mary's Church was erected during the pastorate of Rev. L. A. Lambert. Additions were made under the management of Rev. James Harrington, who for many years served the Parish. He was succeeded by Rev. Coleman F. O'Loughlin, who served as Pastor until his death. Father McCall was next in line, coming to Waterloo in June of 1929.

Father McCall served at Holy Family Church, Auburn for two years, at St. Mary's Church, Rochester, for four years and was Pastor of St. Michael's Church in Livonia Center, for fourteen years previous to coming to Waterloo.

## 4th Degree K.C. Masters Support Card. Mindszenty

The Fourth Degree leaders deplored the arrest of the Hungarian Cardinal and sent copies of the resolution to President Truman and representatives in Congress. They condemned Euthanasia or "mercy-killing," and sent copies of the resolution to Governor Dewey, majority and minority leaders and various representatives in New York State Legislature.
