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Culture Speaker Deplores Court's School Decision

The Supreme Court decision prohibiting religious teaching in public schools "is the most serious threat to the Bill of Rights and constitutional democracy that has come up since the Civil War."

So declared Prof. James Milton O'Neill, chairman of the Department of Speech at Brooklyn College, in a Christian Culture Lecture Series talk Sunday night, Jan. 30, at Aquinas Institute.

"If the people of the United States accept this kind of decision," Professor O'Neill asserted, "we will be living under a dictatorship of nine people of the Supreme Court."

In refusing to the people of Chicago, Illinois, the right to continue religion classes, the Supreme Court has denied them the exact freedom of action that the First Amendment to the Constitution was designed to protect."

THE COURT RULING resulted from a suit brought against the Chicago public schools by Mrs. Vashti McCollum, a former Rochesterian and daughter of Arthur G. Cromwell, president of the Rochester Free thinkers. Mrs. McCollum sued to outlaw the teaching of religion in the Chicago public schools.

"The McCollum decision," Professor O'Neill said, "denies every historical precedent and involves the integrity of constitutional democracy."

Documenting his talk with historical fact, the speaker traced the development of the American interpretation of the First Amendment, declaring it was not intended as a ruling against public support of religion.

"It provided only," he contended, "that Congress should make no law respecting the establishment of a religion. Time went again — even today — the government has used public funds for the support of religious functions, including expenditures for military chaplains."

A specialist on the Constitution, Professor O'Neill spoke on "Religion and Education under the Constitution." Author of several books, he is formerly of Victor and Canandaigua, where he attended high school. He has three sisters in Rochester.
