"The interesting part of the Society of the Atonement is that it was not founded by a Catholic, but by a Protestant Minister in the Anglican or Episcopal Church or as it is known in Great Britain, the Church of England."

With this statement, the Rev. David F. Gannon, S.A., Guardian of St. John's Atonement Seminary, Montour Falls brought to 200 members at the Sodality of Our Lady, St. Patrick's Church, Elmira, banquet in Mark Twain Hotel Jan. 16, the story of his order and its plans in Rochester diocese.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. William J. Brien, V.F., pastor of St. Patrick's spoke briefly on the work of the Sodality.

When renovations are completed at the Friar's newly acquired property at Montour Falls, formerly Cook Academy, it will become a seminary for students in the Society of the Atonement, the speaker stated.

ON TAKING OVER the building Father Gannon read among records "What we might consider a prophecy," he said. In the archives of a "fine school abandoned by the Baptists," was written that Cook Academy may change and perhaps it should not remain as it used to be, but it will always remain a force for good in a changing world.

Father Gannon said that the request of Charles Cook that the building "should always remain a Christian school was a great help to us in the final negotiations to secure the property."

The birth of the idea of establishing the Religious order that has now taken over Cook Academy was formed and took root in the mind of a ten-year-old boy whose name was Lewis T. Wattson, the speaker recalled.

"The idea was implanted in the mind of the boy by a remark made by his father, the Rev. Joseph Newton Wattson, who at that time—1873—was the rector of the Episcopal church at North Kent, Maryland," Father Gannon recounted.

"THE MINISTER said to his son: 'I was present once in the Roman Catholic Cathedral of Baltimore when the Paulist Father Walworth preached to a vast congregation that packed the building to the doors.' Then he added, 'What we need in the Episcopal Church is a preaching order like the Paulists.'"

"Instantly the boy heard an interior voice saying 'that is what you will do some day, found a preaching order.'"

"Eventually the boy entered the ministry of the Church of his forebears, the Anglican."

"THE DREAM of his life was his when he was a nun of the Anglican church established the Society of the Atonement in 1899 at Garrison, N. Y., on a mountain known throughout the Catholic world as Graymoor."

The Anglican minister, the Rev. Mr. Wattson at Graymoor was greatly influenced by the Oxford Movement in England 70 years before his Society was established. Mr. Wattson became one of the leaders of the pro-Roman movement in this country.

The minister founded "The Lamp" a magazine still the organ of the Society and in 1908 started the Church Unity Octave now widely observed.

Father Gannon told how the minister became a Catholic and was ordained a priest in Dunwoody Seminary in 1910, and brought the Society with him into the church.

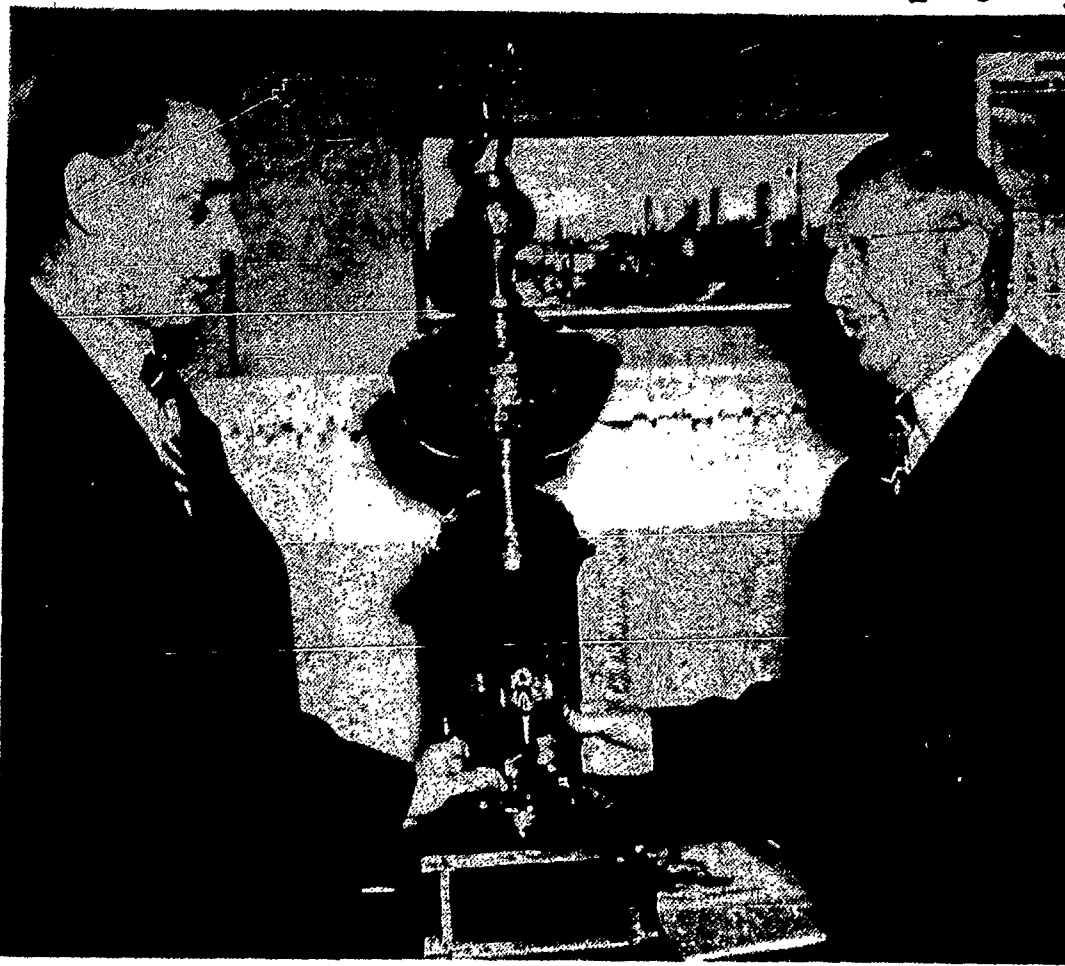
