## \$175,000 Drive For Church Set To End Monday

Working to double the report made Monday night and assure victory in the \$175,000 goal for St. Margaret Mary's new church, the army of 250 workers will cover all prospects before the final report meeting Monday.

The campaigners were spurred to greater efforts by talks given by the Most Rev. Walter A. Foery, Bishop of Syracuse and Supervisor Thomas E. Broderick of Irondequoit, last Monday, in the Rogers Parkway school auditorium.

BISHOP FOERY who was a classmate of the Rev. Charles J. Bruon, St. Margaret Mary's pastor, at St. Bernard's Seminary urged workers and their prospects to think of the new church now under construction in terms of people instead of brick and mortar.

Broderick paid a personal tribute in Father Bruon and urged sufficient funds be secured to erect the church as a suitable monument to the activities of the church's only pastor over the past two decades.

Largest single contribution was \$5,000, given by the Altar Society of the church. Other large contributions included \$1,500 by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph P. Flynn, \$1,200 by Mr. and Mrs. John Hadlock; \$1,000 by Oscar Kohl, Arthur J. Bamann, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Rodenhouse, Mr. and Mrs. John Petrossi, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Sargent, Dr. and Mrs. Francis, and Mrs. William Finley.

Pledges of \$500 each were reported from Mr. and Mrs. Thomas G. Comerford, Ray Beaucare, Eaton Hammond, G. J. Fuhrmann, C. Milton Seager, A. Petrossi, George D. Bryant, Carl Wattel, Joseph Iaman, Charles Repp, J. Selbold, John Canipa, William G. Kearney, John J. Burke, R. Weidgen, Wallace Wolf, H. Lane, Joseph Weber, Frank Lahan, Charles Glaz and Angelo Wiolenak.

Reported Monday was \$88,000 or 51 percent of the quota. Of the total turned in the teams reported \$25,524 on 438 pledges while the special committee had 112 pledges for \$36,468.

Directing the campaign are general chairman Arthur J. Bamann and co-chairman John M. Blackwood.

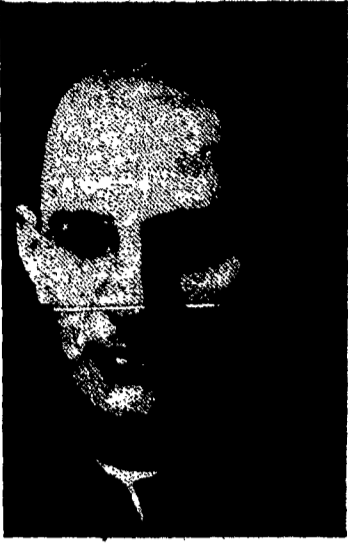

## Aquinas Series Slates Travel Lecture Sunday

Ninth event on the Christian Culture Lecture Series at Aquinas Institute auditorium of this season is an illustrated lecture by world traveler Robert Stanton who will show color motion pictures in a report on the Arab World. The program begins at 8:15 Sunday evening, Feb. 13.

Mr. Stanton's pictorial talk, "Flight Into Egypt—The Arab World," will include an analysis on current trends in this political, cultural, economic and religious center of the Moslem Middle East.

The film is said to tell the story of travel and adventure in the air age. ## Non-Catholics Get Bid To Public Instructions

Rochester's first public instruction series for non-Catholics seeking information about the Catholic Church will open at Hotel Seneca next Tuesday evening, Feb. 15, at 8 o'clock under the sponsorship of the Catholic War Veterans of Monroe County.

Offering a complete course of instructions on the principles and practices of Catholicism, the series will extend over 24 Tuesday evening periods. There will be no fees for the instructions and all textbooks and study material will be furnished free.

THE REV. RICHARD TORMEY, associate editor of the Courier Journal, will be instructor of the first convert class formed.

Each informal instruction in the series will last one hour. Father Tormey stated, and will be followed by a question period. Beginning with talks on the existence of God, the divinity of Christ and the place of religion in life, "the series will treat logically every phase of faith and morals required to prepare the inquirers for baptism," he said.

In announcing specific details of the information series Father Tormey and CVW officers emphasized that the instruction classes were for non-Catholics only. The parish committees of the veterans were laying particular stress on soliciting the attendance of the non-Catholic spouses mixed marriages in their respective parishes.

"WE HAVE RECEIVED many calls asking whether Catholics who want further instruction in their religion may attend the series," Father Tormey said. "But we have had to refuse them for the object of the course and the facilities we have will only be for well-intentioned non-Catholic inquirers."

"For a few weeks, however, we will welcome Catholics who offer to bring non-Catholic friends to begin instructions."

The convert-making plan, approved by the Chancery, is being financed by ten CVW posts of Monroe County. The veterans have pledged themselves to promote the series by personal solicitation among their non-Catholic friends and associates. The general public is being invited through newspaper advertising. The program was unanimously voted at the annual convention of the Monroe County CVW held in East Rochester last month.
